The Second Well—Painting Stand Pipe. The second well for the water-works has reached a depth of 63 feet. About 28 feet from the surface of the ground rock is struck and it continues till a depth of about 110 feet is reached then comes blue quick-sand more; difficult to pass through than rock is. This extends to a depth of 305 feet and then rock sets in again. Of what thickness this is, is not known as the first well was stopped at a depth of 330 feet, suitable water having been obtained without drilling entirely through it.
