"The Atlanta Journal, of the 7th, inst. comes to us with a, good likeness of Josephus Daniels, accompanied by a sketch of his life. It says "Mr. Daniels has held four positions since the fourth of March, and no such change has marked a higher step for him, his friends wonder what will come next to the young North Carolinian."

The telegraphic summary says Secretary Carlisle was at the capitol Saturday closeted with Senator Voorhees and other Senators, as Blackburn and Harris. After conference Senator Voorhees said no compromise was looked for. The administration would not back down from its position and would fight to the last for "unconditional repeal."

The Railway Commission have received the annual report of the Atlantic and North Carolina Railway. A fine showing is made. A dividend of 2 per cent. will be declared this month. The earnings of the road for the four years of the present management are \$604,000 for the last four years of the old management. The cash balance is \$54,000, after having paid a debt of \$56,000 made by the former management. The operating expenses are less than 52 per cent. of the gross earnings. There are nearly 18,000 shares, of which the State owns nearly 13,000.

Thirty new cases of yellow fever at Brunswick and two new cases at Jessup. One of the doctors at the latter is down with the disease. The place is calling piteously for help.

The Gymkana races will be repeated Thursday. All the good features of the last meeting will be repeated and some new and interesting ones added. One additional one will be a goose race by young ladies.

Read the city ordinance published this morning in reference to teams standing on Queen street below Hancock at train time. The ordinance goes into effect next Tuesday. From that time on the teams so standing will be subject to a fine of five dollars.

Maysville was pretty well represented in the city Tuesday. The following parties were in from that place all bringing cotton: Messrs. Lewis Bynum, A. J. Aman, K. R. Hay, Allen Dixon, J. B. Costen, and W. R. Humphrey. Mr. Costen's daughter Miss Annie also came in with him.

At the Free Will Baptist church last night, the ordinance of feet washing was observed. This was the first time in thirty five years. Elder Lupton stated and the last time was on the same spot of ground on which the new church stands. The church was packed—probably nearly two hundred present. A good array of ministers at least six were among the number.

Nearly Wrecked on the 3d Inst.
A correspondent writes us from New River that the schooner Katie Edwards, Capt. J. F. Moore was driven ashore on the beach near New river Inlet by the gale on Tuesday night the 3d inst. The cargo, consisting of general merchandise, principally for B. F. Hall & Co. of Jacksonville, was all saved by the fishing crew without being damaged. The vessel is not off yet, and is supposed to be damaged very badly. Capt. Moore and crew worked manfully all night, but the wind being from off the ocean he could not tack, and consequently was driven to the beach.

NEW BERNE FAIR RACES.

Twelve Trotting and Running Races—Rules That Govern—Total Premiums \$2,500.

TUESDAY, FEB. 20TH, 1894.

1st. Trotting to harness, 3 minute class. Purse \$200, mile heats—best 3 in 5.

2d. Running, Purse \$75. 2 1/2 mile heats, best 3 in 5.

3d. Trotting to harness, 2 1/2 mile heats, best 3 in 5.

4th. Trotting to harness, 2 1/2 mile heats, best 3 in 5.

5th. Running, purse \$100, 2 1/2 mile heats, best 3 in 5.

6th. Trotting to harness, 2 1/2 mile heats, best 3 in 5.

7th. Trotting to harness, 2 1/2 mile heats, best 3 in 5.

8th. Trotting to harness, Free for all, purse \$350, mile heats, best three in five.

9th. Running race, purse \$100, 2-3 mile heats, best 3 in 5.

10. Trotting to harness, 2 1/2 mile heats, best 3 in 5.

11th. Trotting to harness, Consolation race for horses that have not won first or second money in any race. Purse \$200, mile heats, best 3 in 5.

12. Running, purse \$75, 2 1/2 mile heats, best 3 in 5.

CONDITIONS.

1. Entrance fee, 10 per cent of purse.

2. At least five horses to enter and three to start.

3. Money divided—50 per cent to first horse, 25 per cent to second, 15 per cent to third, and 10 per cent to fourth.

4. Entries for all races close at 11 o'clock p. m., February 3. One-half of entrance money payable on February 1, and one-half by or before 11 o'clock p. m., February 15th. No attention paid to entries unless accompanied by fee.

5. In entering horses, the name, age, sex and color of the animal must be given, with names of sire and dam, if known; also name and residence of owner accompanied by the last payment, by or before 11 o'clock p. m., February 15th 1894.

6. Records made after January 1, 1894 are no bar to these races.

7. The Society reserves the right to change the programme to meet the casualties of the weather. Should the weather be so inclement on any day of the Fair week as to prevent the Director from starting the races, such races at the option of the Executive Committee, may be declared "off," and the entrance money for them returned. Heats in each day's races may come off alternately, according to the orders of the Director.

8. The National Trotting Association Rules will govern all trotting trials, except that no horse shall be entitled to more of the purse than is offered by the Society for the place he obtains.

9. No premiums paid to distanced or ruled out horses. Premiums will be paid on Saturday of Fair week, by Secretary, on certificate of the Judges, and countersigned by the Director of Department in Trials of Speed.

10. All horses entered for races, Nos. 1 and 7, must have been owned in North Carolina on or before September 1st, 1893.

Ordinance.

Be it ordained that from and after the 16th of October, 1893, it shall be unlawful for any team or vehicle to stand on Queen street between East Front and Hancock during the arrival and departure of trains. Violation of this ordinance shall subject the offender to a fine of five dollars.
