A DEAD BEAT ALSO.

Edward Murphy, of New York (N. Y.)—And His Delays in Greenville.

The tickets to the recent boxing match that came off in New Berne read "between Edward Murphy, of Norfolk" etc. Yet we have information from Norfolk that there is no such personage as Edward Murphy prize-fighter, known to the sporting fraternity of that city.

We have also a letter from Greenville, N. C., which below we lay before our readers:

EDITOR JOURNAL:—"On Saturday night, Sept. 30, I was awakened by Mr. Murphy, who at the time was drunk, but representing himself to be a cigar drummer from New York, I admitted him to a room.

On Sunday morning he appeared in the office of my hotel at 11 o'clock and asked what time the next train would arrive from Rocky Mount, as he expected his wife to come on the first train. Upon being questioned some about his late arrival the night before he stated that he had a fight in Tarboro which cost him \$70.00 and he was afraid to stay there, and seemed to exhibit some uneasiness for fear of being telegraphed for from Tarboro.

On Monday morning he ate breakfast and walked out of the dining hall and the next I heard of him was in your paper of Oct. 12th. He left me a legacy of \$2.25 which you may have if you can collect.

I am glad Craven county is feeding him, as I am sure it is more able to do it than I am. Hoping he may have a good rest from his pugilistic labors.

Though such facts as the above are developing there are some who thought at the time of the trial that Magistrate Street made Murphy's bond unnecessarily high when he placed it at three hundred dollars while others thought, it ought to have been at least a thousand. In looking at one way, considering that this class of people rarely have more than enough to take them from one town to another, even the small bond fixed upon means considerable. And, even those who would be willing to go on such a bond know that it means that much cash out, and but few are willing to part from that amount of money in such a way.

It is now more strongly established than ever that Murphy is of the migratory class. No place has been established as his home. Here he claimed to have come from Norfolk, but he has not been acknowledged there and at Greenville he claimed to be of New York, while there are indications that he is of Richmond.

More About the Wrecks.

A Carteret county correspondent writes us as follows: "The storm did considerable damage along the coast and sound. Capt. John Bloodgood in the flat May Queen was blown on the shore high up in Mr. R. H. Humphrey's field. She was loaded with cotton and naval stores for New Berne. The cargo went overboard but was saved. The flat is still high and dry.

"The large schooner Jenny R. Tomlinson from New York bound to New Berne went ashore on the beach about five miles east of Bogue bar on Friday evening of the storm. She is a splendid, new three master and is at this writing (Oct. 16th) high on the beach buried in the sand about 6 feet. She was loaded with phosphates and kaolin, her captain, John Tomlinson, thinks she can be gotten off, a very large crowd of visitors was on to see her Sunday. It was a great pity for the owners, as she was a fine vessel only 2 years old and well built, only a short while back the C. C. Davidson, owned by the same firm was lost on Virginia beach; a total loss we hear.

"The large three mast schooner John W. Hall, bound to Swansboro is supposed to be lost.

"Capt. Buckmaster, schooner Frank Hall, lost 2 anchors in saving his schooner. This was the worst storm on our coast in 20 years."

Another special telegram to the JOURNAL from Beaufort brings the following account of yet another wreck:

BEAUFORT, N. C., Oct. 17th—Schooner Maggie Andrews, lumber laden from Darien for Providence stranded twenty miles north of Cape Lookout, vessel and cargo total loss, the crew were saved.

Death of Mr. S. D. Black.

A telegram Tuesday announced the death of Mr. Samuel D. Black, son of Rev. W. S. Black superintendent of the Oxford Orphan Asylum, at his home in Oxford.

He was about 23 years of age and had spent the greater part of the present year in New Berne.

Mr. Black was passionately fond of fine horses, and a few years ago he was attracted to the New Berne Fairs and has been a regular attendant at them ever since. At the time of the last Fair he identified himself with the city and spent the summer with Messrs. Hackburn & Willett.

A few weeks ago he left for a trip in Virginia and Maryland, and while away he was attacked by typhoid fever. He then went to his home but died about a week afterwards.

Mr. Black was an upright and most exemplary young man and one of the most agreeable of companions. He made warm friends wherever he went, and his untimely death will occasion sadness to many.

INQUIRY.

The question has been asked through the JOURNAL, which of the three churches in New Berne, namely, the Church of Christ, Christ Church, or the Church of God is the Church which Jesus said, I will build upon this rock; To which an incorrect answer has been given, that the Church of God is known as the Adventist. Churches can only be known by the name in which they organize, and in which there Church property is recorded. Paul once called the Church which Jesus said I will build upon this rock, the Church of the first born, once the Churches of Christ, and again he said ye are Christ and, Christ is Gods.

The name, Christ Church is not once found in the Apostles writing. Paul in twelve texts called the Church, the Church, and Churches of God. Such being God's family name whereby he named his household. A Church is not properly called the Church of God unless it is so organized and having all the ordinances which the Lord committed to his Apostles. The communion of Saints was instituted at night, and so observed by the early Christians, and consisted in first washing one-another's feet, and in taking the emblems of our Lord's broken body and shed blood.

All the early Christians were added to the Church of God by trine immersion. Single immersion was introduced in the fourth century by Eusebius who was made Bishop of Cysicus, Spain in the year of 360, and was expelled from the Church for corrupting Holy Baptism. The backward action in baptizing was introduced in the 16th century by the English Baptists, who are now known as the Primitive Baptist. The people known as Adventists do not commune according to the word of God, and they baptize with the Baptism which was introduced by the English Baptists, and they do not organize in God's family name and they are therefore not the Church of God.
