The W. N. & N. R. regular passenger train made her runs yesterday under the new schedule in three hours. The trip by present schedule is considered a very pretty run.
Atlanta has had a big failure. The Ryan Company, dry goods, have gone into a receivership. Liabilities \$180,000; assets \$10,000.
Cool weather now. The maximum temperature for the twenty four hours ending at 6 o'clock yesterday afternoon was 55 degrees, minimum 36, range 19.
The excavation for the turn table for the W. N. & N. R. R. is being made just back of the Water Works engine house and the ground is being graded for the side track leading to it.
The Charlotte News says the Blue Ridge Hotel at Mt. Airy, which made an assignment in September has been closed and the assignees themselves have made an assignment.
A plump turkey weighing twenty-three pounds dressed will be one of the birds that will grace a table at the Hebrew festival tomorrow. He is from the meat market of Messrs. Samuel Cohn & Son.
We have been told that the big ocean blue fish have again put in their appearance off Roanoke Island, and the Elizabeth City Economist confirms the news. These are magnificent fish and their advent is always hailed with delight.
A mistake of the word bushels for barrels occurred in Sunday's paper in the item in "Good Fall potatoes." Mr. Henry Taylor dug four hundred barrels off of rice and a half acre, and Mr. B. F. Tolson dug at the rate of sixty six barrels to the acre.
The "Birth-day Fete" to be given by the King's Daughters next Friday evening at the Collegiate Institute, promises to be a most enjoyable evening, and we trust will be liberally patronized by the public. A similar one held in Raleigh under the auspices of the Order, met with much encouragement from the citizens. It will be devoted entirely to charitable purposes.

Building Notes.
Mr. L. H. Cutler has commenced the erection of another building on Bern street adjoining the one now occupied by Capt. Geo. M. Crapon.
The handsome residence of Mr. R. C. Kebo on New street is nearly completed and a good start is being made on the one opposite Mr. C. M. Cooper.
Mr. T. J. Turner's new dwelling on Hancock street adjoining his residence though not so large as the latter will be quite a pretty place when finished.
Capt. Dave. Styron is putting up a good dwelling on South Front street just above the Macadamize road.
The dwelling house which Capt. J. J. Laster is erecting at Union Point is about ready for occupancy. It is a neat little place. This and the larger near by on East Front being built by City Marshal Lewis, to take the place of his old one.
The addition recently made to Mr. D. G. Smaws, residence and the repainting of the residence of Mr. W. B. Ellis, and some other recent improvements near taken altogether add considerable to the neighborhood.
The work of remodeling Gaston House has gone far enough to show to every observer acquainted with the place before the work was commenced that it will be about the same as a new building. Four wide and deep stores front the street. They extend farther back than the old building did and above them a number of new rooms have been added.
Where two small rooms were adjoining they have been changed into one large and desirable one but the new rooms added are sufficiently numerous to make the entire number larger than before any changes were made. The new dining room on the second floor is commodious and pleasant. The exterior of the hotel is handsomely painted in century style and the interior will be finished artistically making the hotel a very desirable resort for the regular travelling public or other sojourners in our city.
Finishing touches are being put on the commodious and handsome depot of the W. N. & N. R. R. The offices are likely to be moved over to it next week from the building temporarily occupied.


New Berne and Wilmington's Welcome Week
Our city is now billed at some of the most public places with posters advertising the manifold attractions of Wilmington's Welcome Week, Dec. 5th to 9th, during which time a new programme will be given daily consisting of magnificent displays of fireworks, sham naval and military battles, civil, military and business parades, foot ball and base ball games, bicycle races, a merchants free excursion to Ocean View and an oyster roast and clam bake there, &c.
This will beyond doubt be an interesting occasion and we look for a good number of our citizens to participate in the gathering. Heretofore the lack of direct communication has been somewhat of a bar between the two cities but now that the W. N. & N. R. R. is completed between the two cities we look for a largely increased attendance from each at great public occasions of the other.
The railroads will give greatly reduced rates for Welcome Week and the occasion will be a good starter for the exchange of courtesies between the two cities.
Change of Schedule and Quicker Time.
A slight change of schedule went into effect on the W. N. & N. R. R. Monday, (see time table No. 3 in another column.)
The leaving time of the passenger train from New Berne remains the same, 9 a. m.; the leaving time of the freight train is now 2 p. m. instead of 2:10 p. m.; the passenger train arrives at 3:30 p. m. instead of 6 p. m. as heretofore.
The leaving time of the passenger train from Wilmington is unchanged, but the time made is twenty minutes quicker than the former schedule—the trip being made in three hours.

The funeral will be held from the church this afternoon at 3 o'clock.

Death of Dr. Deems.
Rev. Chas. F. Deems, D. D., pastor of the Church of the Strangers, New York City, died at his home there Saturday night, at five minutes to ten o'clock, aged 78 years.
Throughout the South, Dr. Deems was one of the best known clergymen of the country—especially so in North Carolina.
Dr. Deems was born in Baltimore but spent twenty-five years of his life in North Carolina. He came here as an agent of the American Bible Society when 20 years of age.
In 1861 he was pastor of this (New Berne) district, and previous to that time he was for some years pastor of Centenary M. E. Church in this city.
He visited Europe and Palestine twice. He was the author of about a dozen religious works—the best known being his excellent "Life of Jesus."
As a pulpit orator Dr. Deems was hard to equal, and he would often startle his audience with the enunciation of thoughts that the average mind, it taking a giant intellect like his to fashion, arrange and promulgate them.
Dr. Deems also did considerable religious editorial work and was zealous in behalf of education. He was for a while President of Greensboro Female College, N. C., and later of Rutgers college, N. Y.
Fine Work of the New Berne Collegiate Institute.
Dr. John S. Long President of the Board of Trustees of the New Berne Academy has paid a number of visits to the New Berne Collegiate Institute with the special purpose of looking into the school and seeing what its merits were, and he speaks in glowing terms of the work that is being done.
Among other things he tells us of a class of twelve in Latin that he saw passing an examination yesterday. Out of a number four received 100 and four an average of 90, leaving only four out of the whole class to fall below 90—an exceptionally fine piece of class work.
Dr. Long unhesitatingly and strongly asserts after careful inspection that the school work, though slow and unpretentious, is first-class, and that Prof. Hodges is making thorough scholars out of the pupils who attend, and that as our people realize they will take hold of the school and best that has ever been in the city. Dr. Long is satisfied the school is bound to grow upon its substantial merits.
