**SOME BIRDS AND DOGS.**  
Note: If there is no competition the judge will not award a premium unless there is decided merit, and if they find any article on exhibition not mentioned in the premium list, describing it, they will report the same to the Secretary and he to the Board of Directors.  
**CLASS 1.—GAME.**  
**Birds.**  
Best pair each of woodcock and curlew \$5; English snipe \$4; grayback, single rail, double rail, waltail, yellow slunk, beach plover and oyster birds \$3; quail, doves and meadow larks \$2.  
Best collection and display (not less than six pair) of the above variety by one exhibitor \$15; collection of quail not less than 12, nor more than 15 by one exhibitor \$5; second do. same number \$2.50.  
**CLASS 2.—WATER FOWL, &c.**  
Best pair each, mallard, water witch, white brant and spoon bill \$6; goose, canvas back, bull neck, summer duck, whistler, toadie, bittern, shipcock and marsh hen \$5; mallard black duck, sprigtail, green wing teal, blue wing teal, black brant, bald brant and red head \$4; snuffler, dipper, paddie, coot, livery head, south southerly, blue peter, shell drake, cormorant and blue heron \$3; best swan \$2; loon \$3; wild turkey \$1.  
Collection (not less than 8) of variety in this class by one exhibitor \$30.  
**CLASS 3.—GAME QUADRUPES.**  
Best exhibit each, otter and beaver \$15; bear, deer (not less than 2) panther cat and wild cat \$10; fox and mink \$5; weasel \$3; squirrels, musk rat, opossum and flying squirrel \$2; white rabbit \$1; gray do. 50 cents.  
Collection (not less than 8) of above variety by one exhibitor \$40.  
Notes.—Premiums on any one article cannot compete with collection.  
Premiums in half of above amount for similar exhibits of above varieties, dead, but no premium given to any one exhibit on both—single birds will receive partial premiums where there are no pairs of same kind.  
**CLASS 4.—BIRDS OTHER THAN GAME.**  
Best live mocking bird \$5; collection live game and mixed birds (not less than 12) \$10.  
**CLASS 5.—PIGEONS.**  
To be shown in matched pairs. Best each African owls, antwerps, archangels, barb, blondinettes, carriers, Chinese, dragons, English owls, fantails—smooth heads, hooded and crested; helmets, ice, Jacobins, magpies, moorheads, nuns, pointers, priests, quakers, rants, satinettes, snells, sports, subbian, swallows, trumpesters; tumbler—plain, hooded, almond and bald head; turbitens and turbits, 50 cents.  
Dogs—Best each, St. Bernard, mastiff, setter, Newfoundland shepherd, black and tan; English and Italian gray hounds, fox hounds, coach pointer and Scotch terrier \$2.
