They were 150 lbs. and 100 lbs. weighing 600 lbs. and 600 lbs. the second 600 lbs. and 500 lbs. the third 520 lbs. and 600 lbs. making in all 1-631 lbs. of pork.

Mr. Atkins at the same time killed a year old pig that weighed 334 gross and 290 net.

This is a fine showing and makes plain the fact that as the hogs are to be grown here is anywhere else. All we need is the proper effort, a little more pains, and better stock than the pine root and razor back.

A Good North Carolina Invention.

Mr. C. A. Holland, a former Fayetteville boy, but for a number of years a progressive citizen of Maxton, has recently invented and patented an improvement on points for driven wells which is briefly described as follows:

The flanged point is a decided improvement over the plain point now in use, as it drills out a water space around the strainer, insuring a full flow of water to the pump. It can be sunk in half the time and with less pipe than with the plain point, thereby saving the extra expense of pipe and labor. It also drives more easily than the plain point, as the side flanges cut straight through the earth, preventing the point packing.

The point has been thoroughly tested and in every case where a pump was working hard, and the point replaced with the flanged point a full flow of water was produced.

Mr. Holland has 3000 in right now in Fayetteville, and he has more than two thousand of the improved points per month on which he receives a handsome royalty.—Wilmington Star.

Good for the Farmer.
A good many farmers were in the city today. They report that the wheat and oats are looking finely. The mild winter will probably result in a short fruit crop next year, but aside from that the outlook for 1894 is very good. The farmers owe fewer debts now than for years past, and they start into 1894 in better shape than any year since 1873.—Charlotte News.
