**LEGISLATIVE DELAY.**

We often hear of the Law's Delay, and men are excused for taking the law in their own hands upon the plea that justice is delayed beyond the power of human endurance.

Just now the country is suffering from delay in legislation. No fair-minded and intelligent man objects to serious deliberation and careful forethought upon questions of commanding import, but when the judgement is convinced and the argument exhausted nothing is more commendable than prompt and resolute action.

No subject was ever more thoroughly discussed than the tariff. Parallel the people listened to and read debates upon the tariff from year to year, and in 1892 they declared by an unprecedented majority for a tariff for revenue only in accordance with the Chicago platform. The demand for tariff reform became imperative, and Congress was urged by every consideration of public and private interests to execute the deliberate judgement of the people. For many months the Wilson bill has been before Congress, and the people are impatient of delay. They cannot take the law in their own hands, but must continue to suffer from the oppressive burdens imposed by the infamous McKinley law.

For a time Congress threw off its lethargy, and the House passed the Blair bill for the coinage of the seigniorage, with commendable promptness.

It went at once to the senate, and even there it met with no obstruction until it had passed the third reading, and it was in order to vote upon the measure. Then there was a pause. Senators objected to such precipitate action. A motion was made to reconsider the vote by which the bill passed to the third reading, and no man can tell when the end will be. The bill may pass tomorrow, or it may be delayed much longer. That it will eventually pass seems to be conceded, but it is very generally believed that it will be vetoed by the President.

It cannot be expected that the bill can be passed over the Presidential veto. And thus time is lost and the hopes of the people disappointed.

There is most unaccountable delay in the confirmation or rejection of Mr. Simmons. Senatorial courtesy is exhausted, and the vote on Mr. Simmons's nomination should be taken without further delay.

Senator Vance—loved by his constituency and respected by all—has expressed his honest convictions, and it is the duty of the Senate to take definite action. North Carolina is represented in the Senate, and, while the absence of Senator Vance is matter of deep regret, it should no longer retard the settlement of a vexed question seriously affecting the harmony of the Democratic party in North Carolina.

It is of the utmost importance that our decks be cleared for action at the earliest possible moment. The McKinley law must be repealed, the financial situation improved, and internal dissensions healed, before we can entertain a reasonable expectation of victory in the approaching elections.

**A Remarkable Case.**

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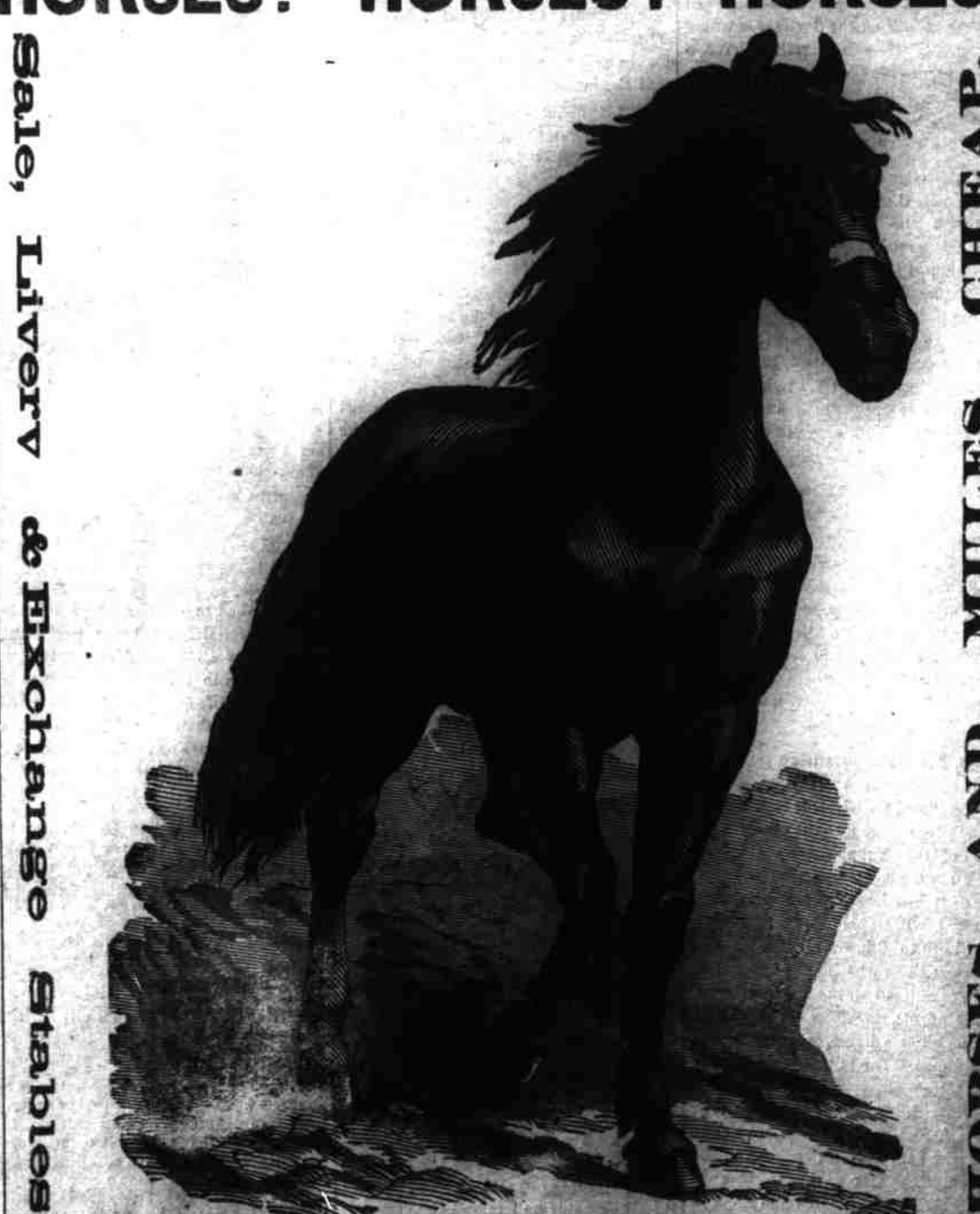
