The schooner *Admiral Henry* from Baltimore, arrived yesterday with hay for C. B. Hill, and general merchandise for J. C. White.

The great sprinkler had a sudden tumble yesterday at the corner of Pollock and Craven streets. It was caused by a slight cave in from a leak in the water works main pipe at that place.

The steamer *New Berne* of the N. N. & W. line took out 3,000 packages of truck yesterday. The *Henry J. Gay* of the B. C. H. line also took out a large quantity.

New Berne is almost as delightful as Morehead for sunbathing. There is scarcely a day but splendid breezes prevail and make it pleasant, especially so on and near the water streets.

On account of the Baptist picnic the young people's meeting of that church will be omitted to night. The rain with the Sunday school will leave just after the arrival of the mail, an hour to get back at 8 p. m.

The *Kinston Free Press* says that Mr. George Boyce Brandon, who edited the *Populist* paper at LaGrange, left that town Saturday night of last week, owing everyone he could get in debt to, and has not returned since.

Alfred Ward, col., and J. T. Harris, col., two convicts sentenced at the term of Superior court were taken up to the penitentiary yesterday by Deputy Sheriff J. D. LaRue. They are each in for two years.

Gentlemen: The Commissioners beg to submit for your consideration the following report of the affairs of the county for the past two years.

### GENERAL EXPENSES.

The expenses of the county for general purposes were for the year ending Nov. 30, 1892, as follows:

Support of poor 2,066.75  
Department of Justice 6,929.44  
Militiamen Department 1,365.14  
Shrill, Jail fees, etc. 3,792.26  
Total \$14,153.59

For the year ending Nov. 30, 1893, they were:

Support of Poor 2,344.55  
Department of Justice 5,919.70  
Militiamen Department 845.18  
Shrill, Jail fees, etc. 1,160.90  
Total \$10,270.33

A comparison of the two months' expenses for the two months ending April 30, 1894, were:

The receipts of the county from all sources, including the Public Debt, for current purposes were:
