The presentation of graduating certificates was also made in the afternoon. The class consisted of Miss Alma Kennedy, Lida Best, Fannie Harper, Mary Boggs, Alice Ivey, Mary Stanton, Florence Speight, Sallie Park, Alice Sanders and Minnie Rice.

The concert at night closed the years work. It opened with a piano quartet, and admirable selections of both vocal and instrumental music filled up the evening. The music was from the grand old masters, and some of the renditions were regarded as among their grandest.

Nearly two hours time was consumed in these delightful exercises, and at their close nearly all present remained about as much longer, enjoying the beauties of the pupil's handiwork in the art department, and in social pleasure.
