MISS LEAH JONES' SCHOOL.

Prizes for Compositions on North Carolina Historical Events—Miss Minnie White Wins Gold Medal on Spelling.

Prof. Edward Daves, of Baltimore, takes a great interest in the children of his native town. He is especially desirous that they should have a thorough knowledge of the early history—written and unwritten, of their own State; and that they should glory in the same.

To stimulate the young people to this study, Prof. Daves has been, for some time, offering a yearly prize for the best composition on the historical subjects. During the past school term, he has offered this prize twice to the pupils of Miss Leah Jones' school. The first subject being "The Settlement of Roanoke," for which Misses Mable Hughes, Adelle C. Pooles, Mary Guion and Maud Kinsey, and Master Hayner Jones, contested. Though only five contested for the prize, the greater part of the school has been making an especial study of both the geography and history of North Carolina. They have read Prof. Daves' "Roanoke," New Fort in Virginia, also Prof. Wicks' "Last Colony of Roanoke," and have written compositions on "St. Walter Raleigh," "Last Colony of Roanoke Island," "The Last Colony," etc.

In this contest the pupils had not the slightest help in compiling the information gained from their readings and from histories. The teacher even refusing to correct their work as to spelling and punctuation. The compositions were sent to Prof. Daves, and he handed them to Prof. Adams, who is professor of History of Johns Hopkins University, who decided Master Hayner Jones to be the best and Miss Maud Kinsey's the second best.

The young people of New Berne should appreciate Prof. Daves' kind interest and strive by cultivating themselves in body, mind and heart to make the history of dear old North Carolina what it has ever been, the pride of her sons and daughters. It is but fair to state that Prof. Adams knew nothing of the children, not even their names.

In the contest for spelling Miss Minnie White won the gold medal which Miss Jones offered to the best speller.

Death of an Estimable Lady.

Miss Annie Bell, a very aged and benevolent Northern Presbyterian lady of considerable means, who has done much valuable service for the cause of education and religion along the immediate coast of this part of the State, died at Harker's Island Friday and will be buried at Beaufort today.

Though Mrs. Bell was a Presbyterian, the Northern Methodist churches, now about a dozen in number, of that region, and the flourishing school at Marshallberg, of which Presiding Elder Graham is President, really owe their existence to her. During a visit about the close of the war she discovered that the people of Harker's Island, to attend church, had to go about six miles by water and she generously built a good church, the one known as Free Grace church for them, and gave it to the Methodists, as most of the people were of that denomination, but being of the North, she gave it to the Northern instead of the Southern branch of that denomination, and from that beginning the work has grown to its present proportions.

Much of the time since her first acquaintance with the people she has made the island her home and devoted her services, as we said, in whatever way she could to advance the cause of education and religion among those in the vicinity. She was highly esteemed and greatly beloved by all the people around, and her death will carry sorrow to many a home.
