The parlor car "Old North State" was put on again last night by the A. & N. C. Railroad for the summer season.

Three hundred and seventy-five tents have been shipped to Morehead City for the use of the annual encampment, of the Third and fourth regiments, which begins on the 20th. It is understood at Raleigh that the Goldsboro Rifles will encamp privately this week and use some of the tents.
