TRINITY COLLEGE.
There is nothing in which North Carolinians should be more interested than Education. Our common school system is accomplishing much good and we trust that its blessings will be extended until a practical business education will be within easy reach of all our sons.
As North Carolinians we are proud of the State University, and we Methodists would be ashamed of ourselves if we did not rejoice in the prosperity of Wake Forest and Davidson, but we confess to a warmer attachment to Trinity College. In the past it has met the expectations of its friends and we trust that its future will be still more glorious.
For the College to reach its highest efficiency, the right man should be at its head; and, in our opinion that man is L. W. Crawford.
Without intending to reflect upon the past management of the institution, we have no hesitation in saying that the President of Trinity should be a North Carolinian who is in touch with the great mass of North Carolina Methodists.
Who is wider or more favorably known to our people than Brother Crawford?
For four years he has been connected with the College and is dedicated to its interests.
He has every requisite for the position. His scholarship may not be equal to some of the great educators of the day, but it is equal to the demands of the place and the occasion, while in executive ability, in personal magnetism and confidence-inspiring qualities he is the peer of any man.
Give us Crawford for President and associate with him an able faculty and the future of Trinity is assured.

EDUCATION.
In a recent article we took occasion, in referring to the approaching campaign, to insist upon bringing living issues to the front and making it essentially a State campaign having for its object the honor of the State and the welfare and happiness of the people. We expressed a preference for a platform favoring the construction and maintenance of good roads and the improvement and enlargement of our common school system.
Our object this morning is to call attention to the excellence of our graded schools and the demand for longer terms and a more cordial sympathy in the great work they are accomplishing.
If the late Commencement exercises at the University, Davidson, Trinity and Wake Forest colleges, and at the female schools and colleges at Salem, Raleigh, Oxford, Greensboro, Kinston, and other educational centers, evince progress, it is largely attributable to the graded schools which are the foundation stones on which our more imposing educational structures rest. To one brought up under the "old field school" system, the graded schools present a revelation at once surprising and inspiring. Having observed the progress of events, we will not say that the present system is perfect, but we know that it surpasses the former as the meridian sun exceeds in

brightness the first ray of the morning.
If anywhere there is thought of abandoning the graded school, let those who are contemplating the change consider how it is possible to build without a foundation, and what better foundation can be had for our educational system than that furnished by the graded school.
North Carolina cannot afford to neglect the education of her children. Her honor, no less than the happiness and prosperity of her people is involved. General education is an imperative demand wherever suffrage is general, and in a state where suffrage is universal, education should be universal.
It is admitted indeed it is evident—that the state of North Carolina cannot provide adequate public instruction for all her children. She can keep the graded schools going long enough to lay the foundation, afterwards the work of the State must be supplemented by individual effort, and that community is recreant to duty that fails to secure adequate facilities for higher education.
We must keep pace with the times in which we live if we would leave our impress upon the ages. Let us build factories, diversify labor and beautify our homes, but above all, we must educate our children.

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
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
