THE BATTLE FOUGHT.

Not With Bullets, But Bank Cartridges - A Brilliant Engagement.

A great deal of interest had been maniested in the sham battle between the two sections of the New Berne Naval Reserve The Division under command of Lieut Clark, marched from its armory about sunset, forty strong, to the fair grounds, where section 2, in charge of Chief Petty officer Daniels, was placed at the northwest corner of the grounds under cover of buildings erected for fair purposes.
