A RAINBOW.

A Southern Associated Press dispatch, dated Washington, August 3, says: "After the cabinet meeting today four members announced, each to a different person that an agreement had been reached by the Senate and House conferees on the Tariff bill.
 The basis of agreement was not disclosed, but one of the most distinguished members of the cabinet said to a United Press representative, 'you can announce that the President will sign a tariff bill within ten days.'
 Here, then, is the bow of promise. We do not know the details of the agreement, but it is cheering to learn that a bill will be passed in ten days that will have the approval of the President.
 The people have become impatient of delay and will be sure to hold obstructionists of the Senate responsible for whatever evil has resulted.
 Who are these obstructionists? It is gratifying to know that neither of the Senators from North Carolina have for a moment stood in the way of Tariff reform.
 We cannot do better that permit the Charlotte Observer to speak for us on tariff obstructionists.
 In its issue of the 4th inst. it says:
 'One can hardly blame Senator Hill for his opposition to the tariff bill with the income tax in it, for his State is no doubt very generally opposed to the income tax and he is there to represent his State. There is some excuse—though not so much—for the stand the Louisiana Senators have taken with reference to the sugar duty, for their State is largely interested in sugar, though it is not its only interest, as might be inferred from the zeal of these Senators for a protective duty on it. The persistency of Mr. Murphy, of New York, for a heavy duty on collars and cuffs is provincialism gone to seed and misrepresentation unparadiseable, for all of his constituents wear collars and cuffs sometimes, while only a few people in his own town, Troy, are interested in their manufacture. A few New Jerseyans conduct sugar refineries and pay their ignorant foreign labor starvation wages, yet Mr. Smith would defeat the tariff bill rather than see these refiners deprived of their protection. Maryland's interest in coal and iron is very slight, but Messrs. Gorman and Gibson must have protection for these, otherwise they won't work. What the peculiar concern of Mr. Brice, of Ohio, in a high protective tariff is, does not clearly appear, but he is one of the chief of the obstructionists. Those Democratic Senators having the poorest defence for their conduct are Brice, Gorman, Gibson, Smith and Murphy. Maryland is expressing its opinion of its Senators very freely and unanimously, so is New Jersey of its Mr. Smith and New York of Mr. Murphy. It is time that Ohio took Brice in hand, and as for Louisiana, it is very probable that upon a full vote of its people it would support the House in preference to the Senate tariff bill. The country as a whole has placed its mark on every one of the men named in the foregoing, and it is very certain that none of them can ever get anything from it.'

New Southern Industrial Enterprises.
 DESPITE the delay in the passage of the Tariff bill, the South seems to have experienced a decided industrial revival. Forty-five new industries are reported by the tradesman of Chattanooga, Tenn., for the past week alone.
 Prominent among these new investments have been a \$500,000 asphalt enterprise at Fort Worth, Texas; a \$100,000 phosphate company at Ocala, Fla.; a \$100,000 saw mill at Patterson, La.; a \$100,000 lock works at Floridya, Ark.; a \$35,000 brick yard at Piquemine, La.; and a \$25,000 oil mill at Newnan, Ga.
 The rivalry of Egyptian cotton with the American product has not prevented the establishment of cotton gins and mills at Gillet, Ark.; Minden, La.; Colton, Ga.; Loringburg and Maxton, N. C.; and Waco, Tex., besides a knitting mill at Madison, Ga. Another noticeable feature of Southern prosperity has been the erection of the Great Kanawh Electrical Manufacturing plant, with \$2,000,000 capital, and the establishment of electrical plants at Keyser, W. Va., Richmond, Va., and Houston, Tex.
