A runaway case was brought to light yesterday. A married man of Wilmington, ran off with a young girl—under fifteen years of age and came up to New Berne.

Major Stanton passed through yesterday morning to inspect the government improvement work near Morehead City which has lately been going forward under Maj. Chadbourne. Mr. Chadbourne went down also.

Messrs. G. H. Waters & Son are thoroughly overhauling the omnibus which was formerly run by Mr. J. W. Stewart. It will be made sane as new, and used in connection with the Chattawka hotel as soon as it opens.

The Messenger tells of the bold robbery of two adjoining residences; those of Mrs. Ross Bivins and Mr. John Meier. Kitchens were robbed of all provisions and from the houses some silver ware a little money and a bran new gold watch and chain stolen. One trunk was carried out into the garden and broken open with an ax.

Streams Rising—Damage Resulting.
The continued rains are causing the streams tributary to the Neuse river above New Berne to rise considerably. The water is over the bridge at Snow Hill and is two and a half feet deep in the steamer warehouse and it was built, we are told, four feet higher than water was even expected to come.

The water in Swift creek is higher than it has been since 1877, and it continues to rise. The Swift creek bridge is afloat, and would go down the current, but for the people there having managed so far to hold it at its place by making it fast at each corner and in the middle.

Timbermen are losing quantities of their logs by their breaking loose and going down with the swift current.

Fears are felt that further trouble may be caused but the hope is that the waters will speedily recede.

The Cruiser For Our Boys.
Advices from Washington read as follows: "The Navy Department has decided to have the new cylinder for the United States steamship Montgomery, to replace that cracked on the trial trip; made at the Norfolk navy yard, instead of allowing the contractors to replace it. This will be a work of two months and in the meantime, in order to permit the vessel to remain in active service, the broken engine will be compounded or run with two cylinders instead of three until the new cylinder is finished."
"It is possible that in this way the Montgomery may be availed of to take out the North Carolina militia instead of using the Raleigh, which is not yet finished."

A Mattress Machine.
Mr. Thos. E. Gaskill who recently invented a machine for filling mattresses is now having one of them built, and will in a few days give it a good test and have it on exhibition. Heretofore nothing has been built except the model.
If the machine works as expected, it will enable two men working with it to fill a hundred, possibly a few more, mattresses per day.
By hand it is a fair days work for a man to fill ten or fifteen mattresses per day. The machine will work any material used in filling and may cause quite a revolution in mattress making. A few days more will tell the story.

Firemen's Tournament All the Go.
The Firemen's Tournament is drawing night. It holds on the last three days in this month.
The Atlantics will probably enter four contests—the horse race, the hand reel, and the quick steaming and long distance throwing.
The boys are perfectly satisfied that they will bring home the prize for quick steaming, and hope to do likewise in the hand reel contest and possibly the others. They should practice with the hand reel well between now and the time of the tournament. \$40 is the prize for that, and with it goes the champion ship belt, which is valued at \$75.

New Berne is believed to have the two quickest steaming engines in the world. This is due to modifications made in them by New Berne machinists of inventive talent. One engine goes up to the tournament one year and brings back the prize, and the other engine, the next year. The prize is \$50.
Now as the boys feel so safe on this prize let them show their mettle and see what they can do for the other three. Practice up and get in good trim.

The City Council.
Dr. Frank Hughes, owner of Hotel Chattawka and Messrs. Stewart and Hughes, proprietors, are endeavoring to induce the city authorities to still further improve the condition of South Front street in the vicinity of the hotel. A petition to that effect was presented to the city council and the council referred the matter to the Street and Pump committee with power to act. This is one of the most travelled portions of our streets, and specially needs to be kept in good condition. License was also granted to the hotel to retail liquor.
The Street and Pump committee through chairman Lovick reported the streets in better condition than ever before and attributed it largely to the good judgment and oversight of the Mayor. The committee wisely advised further improvements with shell rock.

A CHARLOTTE SHOOTING AFFRAY.
A Prominent Society Man, Jabez Myers Possibly Fatally Wounded
by Fred Oliver.

The Charlotte News tells of a serious shooting affray in that city on the sixth inst. Fred Oliver shot and badly wounded Jabez Myers, twice. Mr. Myers' recovery is doubtful, but the chances are in favor of it. Mr. Oliver is under a \$5,000 bond.

Both are men of social prominence and both spent much time at Morehead this year. It is supposed that Mr. Myers, who was shot was suffering from aberration of mind—in fact he had shown such signs of it that his friends were considering the advisability of locking him up and the proprietors of the hotel where he stopped were anxious for him to move as the guests were getting disturbed and fearful of some violence. His moving impulse was that two men, Mr. Oliver (the gentleman who did the shooting) and another man had mortally offended him, and he made constant and vigorous threats to have their hearts' blood.

From Mr. Myers' statement the ground of offence was an occurrence at Morehead. He entertained there in lavish style, the crowning social event of the month being a favor German, an elaborate affair, given by him in favor of a St. Louis young lady, and it appears that all the trouble sprang from this German. He was paying attention to the young lady at the time, and he charged that Mr. Oliver broke up the match by telling her mother that Mr. Myers could not afford to give such an event as the German was, and it was under this belief that Mr. Myers harbored the enemy.

When Mr. Oliver returned home he was warned by his friends of the situation and he armed himself. As he was driving at a trot along the street Mr. Myers who was on the porch of a friend's house sprang excitedly towards him, swearing and calling on him to stop. For an answer Mr. Oliver drew his pistol and fired. Myers staggered but resumed the pursuit, and Oliver fired again, when Myers slapped his hand to his shoulder and reeled off and Mr. Oliver went on to the authorities and surrendered.

The first bullet struck Mr. Myers squarely in the chin, shivered the bone, knocked four teeth out, took a downward course and lodged in his throat, near the collar bone. It was extracted by the physicians. The other bullet shattered the right arm so that two and one-half inches of the bone, near the shoulder, had to be removed and amputation was narrowly escaped.

Mr. Oliver is manager of the extensive oil and fertilizer factory in Charlotte and is identified with other leading industries of the city. Mr. Myers is a traveling salesman for a large Northern firm and makes Charlotte his headquarters and is a favorite in both social and business circles there.

Mr. Oliver denies the charge brought against him by Mr. Myers and says he was not even acquainted with the lady.

Mr. Myers was considered by some of the people at Morehead to be acting crazy-like before he left there.

The latest from Mr. Myers is that he is much better. He is at the home of Mr. T. L. Alexander, near where he was shot. He is to be taken to the hospital at the earliest practical moment. He has no fever and all his symptoms are favorable but he has to keep in a sitting posture as the wound in his throat would cause him to choke should he lie down.

OUR PUBLIC BUILDING.
Senator Jarvis Appealed to Procure Its Prompt Construction—His Favorable Reply.

New Berne, N. C., July 26th, 1891.
HON. THOMAS J. JARVIS,
Senate Chamber,

Dear Sir:—Allow me to present for your consideration the matter of our Public Building. You are aware that by act of Congress approved March 2nd, 1889, the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars was appropriated with which to purchase a site and erect thereon a building suitable for Post-office, Customs and Courts at New Berne, N. C.

The site was purchased over three years ago, and nearly five and a half years have elapsed since the passage of the act, and although during this period many buildings have been constructed that were authorized since this one for New Berne, nothing further has been done within our view toward the erection of the building. This eligible site, located in the business center of the town, still remains unimproved, a veritable eyesore, rankly overgrown with grass and weeds a menace to public health and a reproach to official dignity.

Our people have been waiting long and patiently for a commencement of the work only to have their hopes deferred and to see the subject for a long time seemingly wholly forgotten. In regard to the matter we have had some correspondence with our representatives and the office of the supervising architect, the only outcome of which were a few small uncertain assurances that show no indication to materialize to anything substantial.

In view of the growth of our city, the yearly expansion of its business and a large attendant increase in the business of the Post-office here, a Public Building is conceded by all now to be an absolute necessity.

We are told that large bodies move slowly and great undertakings require time for consummation but there is nothing like a little push, and an occasional impetus will sometimes put the wheel in motion.

On behalf of our people and in the interest of this city and section I am constrained to ask you to give us the force of your persuasive argument and influence in furtherance of the construction of the Public Building at New Berne.

We know full well we have a powerful Vulcan at the forge, and will rest satisfied if we shall be so fortunate as to enlist your sturdy cooperation in this matter that seems to require constant and heavy hammering.

My Dear Sir:—In reply to your favor of the 26th of July, I beg to say, that we are informed by the Architect of the Treasury Department that the cause of the delay in commencing work on the Government Building in New Berne has been attributable to the fact that the force in his office was insufficient to prepare the plans and specifications for the large number of buildings provided for by the several acts of Congress. He informs me that he thinks he will be able to commence work on your building by the first of December next.

I also made a special visit today to see the Secretary of the Treasury to urge that the work be commenced on the New Berne building at the very earliest possible day. From him I learned also that the delay had been caused by the insufficient force in the Architect's office, and that this want of force arose from an insufficient appropriation with which to employ the necessary draughtsman. He, however, promised to do what he could to expedite the matter. So I think our New Berne friends may rest assured that the work will be commenced within the next few months.
