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**An Appeal from Corea.**

Mr. YeSung Soo, Corea charge d'affaires, has recently received despatches from Seoul which reveal a most alarming and pitiful condition of affairs among the people of that rocky peninsula.

Only this morning he received a letter from his son, written before the Chinese and Japanese troops invaded the country, which confirms the belief that the most decided of the people of the little kingdom have to contend with starvation. Hundreds are dying daily. Some struggle to maintain themselves, but others commit suicide rather than contend against hopeless chances.

This horrible condition has been brought about by the failure of the crops for two successive years. Last year they were ruined because there was too much rain, which washed away all that was planted and growing. This year there has been a long continued drought, which has been equally disastrous.

The suffering produced by these events among a population of ten millions of people who are strictly agricultural is very great. Farming is the only industry of Corea, and although there is some money in circulation, it is very little, and the government in collecting taxes

for its support is forced to take rice, grain, beans, and even horses and cows.

Last year the government storehouses were thrown open to supply the people with food and seed. This year the storehouses were empty. Then followed riot and rebellion among the natives, who were starving. It was this rebellion that brought the troops of China and Japan. What food and provisions were left have been taken by the invading armies.

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**Marriage for Young Men.**

This is a true story, and one that will apply to many other young men besides this particular one. It is a great pity that this is true, but it is.

A prosperous business man who employs quite a number of clerks said recently that he had been led to the conclusion that the young man who saved and invested his earnings is an exception to the rule. He was surprised to find this to be true. The facts came out when he began reducing his working force as business fell off.

The first to be dropped were those who had no family depending upon them. Then it was that they would confess hadn't saved a dollar, and had no means whatever upon which to live.

The same man also observed that the married men nearly all had saved something, notwithstanding their salaries were no larger, and in some cases less, than those drawn by single men.

By quizzing these young bachelors he found that riotous living was the principal cause of their poverty. Some of them gambled on the quiet, and others just naturally let it go right and left as long as there was any to go.

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
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
