BRASS AND IMPUDENCE.
 The following was sent to Southern Governors:
 "New York, Sept. 9.
 An English committee has been sent here to investigate and denounce Southern lynchings. Will you please telegraph us what you think of English meddling with our affairs—The World.
 Governor Orr has replied in appropriate terms, but his answer is not before us and we cannot quote it, but it is in line with the responses of Gov. O'Ferrall, of Virginia, and Gov. Northern of Georgia.
 Gov. O'Ferrall says: "Things have come to a pretty pass in this country when we are to have a lot of English moralists sticking their noses into our internal affairs. It is the quintessence of brass and impudence. They had better sweep in front of their own doors before seeking to regulate us," and then proceeds in a manly way to vindicate his State.
 Gov. Northern replies his reply in these ringing words:
 "Why come with an investigation to 'denounce' the South just prior to congressional elections when we have just had a negro lynch in Kansas, April 2, another in Ohio on the Sabbath, April 15th, and when white Poles and Hungarians have recently been publicly lynched in Michigan and Pennsylvania, and negroes sent out of Franklin Park, N. J.,

in herds. We challenge investigation by all persons who have the right to investigate these charges, but any attempt upon the part of Englishmen tainted with their own national crimes to arraign us for trial must be considered as a gross impertinence."
 Theorist may rail and philosophers protest, but wherever the Anglo-Saxon race prevails society will protect itself against anarchy, no matter at what cost or by what expedient. If the means of detection, prosecution and punishment are satisfactory men will leave the matter to the law. If not they will create the law themselves. They will not submit to murder, rape, spoliation and outrage. But it is not the color of a criminal's skin that counts. It is the color of the offense that he has committed and the urgency for action outside the forms of law. Under no circumstances will we permit Englishmen to dictate our morals or our politics.

MAINE.
 There is not the significance in the Maine election that is attempted to be given it in the Newspaper world. "Maine gone Republican" stands emblazoned on the head of many columns, as if it was something extraordinary: one of the wonders of the world.
 Pray tell us when it was that Maine was not Republican? Vermont and Maine have gone Republican by increased majorities, and it is equally true that Alabama and Arkansas have gone Democratic by increased majorities.
 This election put the lie upon the often repeated declaration that the present Congress has done nothing. They show that the tariff is having its influence. In States devoted to Protection the Republican party have rallied to the defense of Protection; in States whose people are in favor of a revenue tariff enthusiasm is aroused in behalf of the party that has made such rapid progress on the lines marked out in the Chicago platform. Party spirit has been stimulated, Republicans are more intensely Republican, Democrats, encouraged by Congressional successes, are pressing forward their lines for further victories.
 We do not expect to see a single State lost from the Democratic column. A few congressional districts will be lost, because the party failed to utterly destroy Protection, but a Democratic majority will be preserved in the House, and the war will go on until the triumph of the people is complete.
 We have no idea of redeeming Maine or any of the manufacturing States of the east, but we expect to carry the agricultural States in the west, a majority of the middle states and the solid South.
