QUEEN MARY PUTS BAN ON GAMBLING

WILL STAMP IT OUT IN HER OWN IMMEDIATE ENTOURAGE.

London, June 15.—Queen Mary continues to prosecute her campaign against gambling among society women and demonstrated her determination this week to stamp it out in her own immediate entourage. It seems that the Queen's second dresser, Miss Adeline Chandler, lost \$125 by betting during the Derby week. In order to pay this Miss Chandler sold a collection of autographed photographs of members of the royal family which included those of the Queen, Queen Mother Alexandra and the Queen of Norway.

Miss Selby, Queen Mary's chief dresser, informed the Queen of the fact and gave the name of the dealer who had purchased the photographs for \$150. The Queen bought them back for \$200. She then gave them back to Miss Chandler, but the latter has been sent to York Cottage, where she must remain for a year and a half on an ordinary salary unless she resigns from the royal service. The Queen has also intimated to all the maids in the royal establishment that if she hears of their gambling in any manner they will be dismissed instantly.

EMBARASSING TO LOOK LIKE TAFT

COUNTERPART TELLS OF EXPERIENCES IN WASHINGTON AND ELSEWHERE.

Chicago, June 16.—Capt. Patrick Henry McCue of this city, for thirty-seven years has been the representative of a Vermont marble company, and has traveled so widely as to become known to every marble contractor in the United States. He is a man who attends strictly to business and avoids notoriety, but in the past he has been forced to suffer many embarrassments.

He is of a remarkably good nature and has a smile that is unmountainable, and so pleasant as to attract the attention of all who are fortunate enough to engage in conversation with him. His embarrassment is also due to the fact that he looks so much like William H. Taft, former President of the United States, that he is frequently mistaken for him. In Washington he has been frequently encountered by a man who desired to consult with Mr. Taft and who explained their mission to him before he had an opportunity to reveal his identity.

"The funniest thing that happened in connection with being mistaken for Mr. Taft," said Capt. McCue, "occurred in a little town in Northern New York some time ago. I was sitting in the lobby of the hotel when a man about fifty years of age came up to me and grasping my hand said: 'I am pleased to meet you, Mr. President. I want to thank you for what you have done for me. I have been postmaster of this town for the last twenty-five years, and the salary I get is all I have to live on. When you placed the office in the civil service list you did a favor to me that I shall never forget.'

Capt. McCue finally convinced the old postmaster that he was bestowing his thanks upon the wrong person, but assuring him that he was a friend of the then President and indorsed his civil service order. The postmaster then said: "Well, you look like President Taft, and I know you've got a good heart, and one that is not as cold as that stuff you sell."

"I have been mistaken for President Taft in the city of Washington, but always treated the joke good-naturedly without causing any embarrassment to those who made the mistake. I think a great deal of Mr. Taft, and the compliments I have received upon my appearance being similar to his has had a tendency to make me a little chesty, especially before the recent election. But I still have a great admiration for him, and as a compliment to him I intend to learn how to play golf, with the view of excelling him in that line, if in none other, and I believe I will succeed."
