THE STATE PRESS

Interior cities in the South are greatly interested in what the Panama canal will do for them. The canal would like to know what they will do for it in furnishing exports and imports. We have to produce something for export. We must be sellers instead of buyers in order to get the most out of the South. Just at present we are buying too many things that we ought to produce.—Wilmington Star.

The advice of the department of agriculture of the government to Southern farmers is to keep at home all of the cattle on hand. According to a bulletin just issued by the department there is a big shortage of cattle in the West, and Western dealers are making strong efforts to obtain Southern cattle to be used as breeders. This completely answers the contention of many Southerners that the "scrub" cattle of the South should be disposed of. As the bulletin points out, if the Western breeder can afford to come South to buy these "scrubs," pay the freight on them back home and use them as breeders, it would certainly pay us to keep them here for the same purpose, bringing in in the meanwhile all the blooded cattle obtainable.—Charlotte News.

The fact that the State treasurer finds it difficult to sell bonds of small denominations seems strange in this thrifty age, but it tells very plainly the story of the difference between the Americans and the French. It shows that here very few people, comparatively speaking buy bonds. On the other side of the ocean, in France, which divides the honors with Germany and Holland as being in the lead in point of thrift, there are bondholders by the million, and something like half of them are women. For a great many years France has sold bonds in denominations as small as 25 francs, that is \$5, and laborers, including laundresses, family servants, everybody, buy these and cherish them. They do it as an investment and as a mark of their confidence in and love for France. That country is at this time a hundred times as large as North Carolina and our people learn many things from our little French.—Raleigh Times.

In the northern cities it is a frequent occurrence for shop girls and other workers to be severely fined for being one minute late in the morning, yet whenever business is pressing they are forced to stay an hour or more overtime without receiving one cent of extra pay. In some stores the rule is to fine an employee twenty-five cents for being one minute late, and if this happens in one week, the penalty is doubled, making a fine of 40 cents for each offense—and this too, from employees getting only a few dollars a week, perhaps six. But this situation is in the North, not here in our own South. Working men and women in North Carolina are often heard complaining if they are reasonably docked for being late—perhaps at the rate per hour their wages and this, too, when their employer would not think of asking them to work overtime without pay. What would they say if they were treated as some of these northern workers are?—Asheboro Courier.
