**FORTY THOUSAND "VETS" TO CAMP**  
Blue and Grey will fraternize on the Battlefield at Gettysburg.

**TENTED CITY IS NOW READY.**  
Celebration of Fiftieth Anniversary of Battle will be Notable Occasion.

New York, June 23.—Forty thousand veterans of the war between the North and South will be encamped next week on the field at Gettysburg, the scene of the greatest battle of that struggle. The survivors of the armies that opposed each other will meet again as friends and comrades, not as foes, on the fiftieth anniversary of that mighty engagement. They have lived long enough to forget past bitterness and to remember only the valor that made Gettysburg one of the greatest battles in the world's history.

The reunion will last from July 1 to July 4, inclusive, the first day to be known as Veterans' Day, the second as Military Day, the third as Civic Day and the fourth and last as National Day. Under the direction of officers of the regular army the great camp is now about ready for the reception of the 40,000 old soldiers, many of whom will view the historic battle field for the last time.

Under the regulations adopted, food shelter and entertainment within the tented villages about the battlefield will be given to bona fide veterans only. Those veterans who are to be accompanied by members of their families have been instructed to provide in advance for the housing and boarding of those relatives.

A great tent, seating between 10,000 and 15,000 veterans, will be erected immediately adjoining the camp, and therein will occur all the exercises, except the great military parade and fireworks, and therein, save for the hours set apart for the exercises, the veterans may hold reunions, the tent being arranged to be subdivided into numerous separate inclosures. All veterans of the Civil War, North and South, are urged to wear their army corps' division, brigade and society badges as a means of identification to their comrades in like commands, in the expectation that it will assist in imparting information as to whom and where their different organizations meet and in bringing together comrades who would otherwise, by reason of lapse of time, fail to recognize each other.

Of the four camps, one will contain 2,500 tents, another 1,300 tents, a third about 1,000 tents and a fourth about 400 tents. Each tent will accommodate 12 veterans, and each will be so fitted out as to provide a maximum of comfort for its inmates. Each camp will be a village of straight streets. The veterans will be grouped by States.

The tented villages in which the veterans of the armies of Lee and Meade will live will not be on the Government reservation, but on contiguous tracts of private land rented for the period of the reunion.

**PAGE TO RECEIVE ON JULY FOURTH**

**FOUND HE COULD NOT DISPENSE WITH ANNUAL INDEPENDENCE DAY AFFAIR.**

London, June 22.—One of the most ancient customs and most vital functions of American ambassadorial life in London—namely, the Ambassadors Fourth of July reception to his resident and itinerant countrymen—came near being omitted from the program this year on account of Ambassador Page's inability to find a suitable house in time for the event.

The Fourth of July reception under the late Ambassador Reid at Dorchester House was always the biggest function of the London season, as far as the American contingent was concerned. Last year 5,000 Americans, wearing the red, white and blue label, traversed the grand staircase at the Reid's magnificent residence.

When Ambassador Page took up his new duties he found them so monumental in their accumulation that it was impossible to complete arrangements for a residence, and he has now decided to await the arrival of his wife on the Adriatic, due next Friday, before even outlining his social plans.

A few days ago he consulted Secretary Laughlin, who, owing to his short residence in London, thought that the

Fourth of July function could be dispensed with, but the precaution was taken to consult several resident Americans, and their unanimous verdict was that it would be good policy for the Ambassador to omit the reception, especially as this was his first season here, and that it better be held in the street rather than not at all.

The embassy offices, on Victoria Street, are much too small to accommodate the crowd of visitors from the United States on their Independence Day, and the Coburn Hotel is not suited for such an occasion, for it is a small and old-fashioned home of the British aristocracy.

It was finally decided to engage the reception rooms at Claridge's, where the Ambassador will receive during the afternoon.

The invitations will not be issued broadcast, as in previous years, but advertisement will appear in the papers the day previous stating that any Americans deciding to attend may obtain cards of admission by calling at the embassy offices.
