

COLORED PEOPLE DID MUCH GOOD

Head Of Jewish Committee Tells
Of Government's Action In
Behalf Of Jews.

ASSURED RIGHTS IN BALKANS

Jews In Bulgaria And Servia En-
joy Full Rights—Discrimina-
ted Against In No Way.

New York, Aug. 22.—A statement by Louis Marshall, President of the American Jewish Committee, throws a new light on the note recently sent by the State Department to the Bucharest Peace-Conference, suggesting through regular diplomatic channels that the United States would regard with satisfaction the inclusion in a treaty of a provision securing to all the inhabitants of the territories in question the full enjoyment of civil and religious liberty, without distinction of race or creed.

Mr. Marshall's statement in part is:

"On Jan. 14, 1913, the American Jewish Committee, recognizing the fact that a considerable part of the European territory of the Ottoman Empire would be divided among the various nations that were engaged in the Balkan war, and that the Jewish residents in that territory might in consequence be seriously affected in their civil and religious rights, urged President Taft and the Department of State to make representations to those concerned in the war and to the European powers in order that the status and rights of the Jews who might be transferred from the jurisdiction of the Ottoman Empire to that of the several Balkan states might be protected. Conditions at that time were such, however, that our Government was not in position to act as requested.

"On March 28, 1913, this subject was presented to President Wilson, and on a latter date to the Department of State by Dr. Cyrus Adler, in behalf of the American Jewish Committee, and our Government was requested to exercise its good offices to obtain assurances from the nations concerned in the negotiations for the treaty affecting the conquered territory that the inhabitants of such territory would be assured the full enjoyment of civil and religious liberty without distinction of race or creed."

The statement then goes on to recite in detail the substance of correspondence from the State Department showing what it had done in the way of complying with the requests of the committee, and adds:

"The action of our Government is most gratifying, resulting in the assurance of the conferees that the Jewish citizens of the annexed territories are to be accorded the same consideration as that which other citizens residing therein are to receive. Jews in Bulgaria and Servia enjoy the full rights of citizenship and are not discriminated against in any way. The public and formal assurances of the Roumanian Minister of Foreign Affairs give occasion for the hope that a larger number of Jews will be accorded equal rights under Roumanian rule, and that this act must pave the way for the complete emancipation of the Jews in that kingdom.

"The American Jewish Committee will continue to watch over the interests of the Jews in the Balkan countries, and feels that it can rely upon the aid of our Government in this humane undertaking."

NEW ROAD MATTER UP MONDAY WEEK

BEAUFORT COUNTY PEOPLE
PREFER ROUTE LEADING BY
SPRING HOPE CHURCH.

S. T. Wall, of Edward, Beaufort county, was in the city Friday. He is still very much concerned in the matter of the opening up of a shorter route from his section to New Bern. His petition for the improvement of several miles of road from the Beaufort line into Craven and running along by Spring Hope church, will come up at the next meeting of the Craven commissioners which will be Monday week.

The hitch will come, says Mr. Wall, over the fact that there are two routes proposed and the Commissioners will have to choose between the two. Mr. Wall believes, however, that it can be demonstrated to the satisfaction of the Commissioners that the route that they should select is the one that leads by Spring Hope church. This is the most direct route, and it is the route that the people in Beaufort county, who want to come to New Bern to trade, would like to see opened by Craven county.

200 SAILORS IN A RIOT.

Warship's Men Wreck Two Shops
Because Comrade Was Attacked.

New York, Aug. 22.—To avenge a comrade who was slashed on the face last Monday night 200 sailors of the battleship Florida and marines of the Brooklyn Navy Yard started a riot early yesterday morning on Sands street, Brooklyn.

They heard that the man who had attacked their comrade was in Benjamin Bellacore's barber shop at No. 178 Sands street. When the reserves got there the shop had been wrecked and the rioters were bombarding with bricks Abraham Maltzer's show shop at No. 160. Before the police could drive the bluejackets away this place too had been demolished.

Corporal of Marines Neil S. Folsome, Daniel McGinley and William Mott, all of the Florida, the last named champion boxer of the Navy, were arrested. All three were held for examination on charges of rioting by Magistrate Voorhees in the Adams street court.
