Beyond The Grave

Question of Vital Interest To Be Answered By Coming Bible Lecturer.

Arrangements have been completed for a free public lecture, Friday evening, at 8 o'clock in the Court House. Pastor Benj. H. Barton, of Philadelphia, Pa. will speak on what we are to expect "Beyond the Grave." The doors will be opened free to all, and since that work of the I. B. S. A. under whose auspices the lecture will be given, is purely of an evangelistic nature, no collections will be taken.

The lecturer is a deep student of the Bible, and accepts it as his holy creed or doctrine. He was for many years greatly confused by the many different theories as to what lies beyond the grave. Some said Heaven and Eternal Torment, others said Paradise restored, others said Purgatory, and still others

claimed that there is no hereafter at all, that Death ends everything. He determined to find out if possible the true Scriptural teachings on this important subject. After many years of careful searching he succeeded in harmonizing every verse in the Bible pertaining to the Hereafter, and he now travels throughout the United States and Canada presenting to the public what is often considered to be the most beautiful plan of salvation ever heard. He quotes the Scripture for every point he presents, and none, it is said who believe in the Good Book need leave his audience without a better conception of what lies beyond the grave.

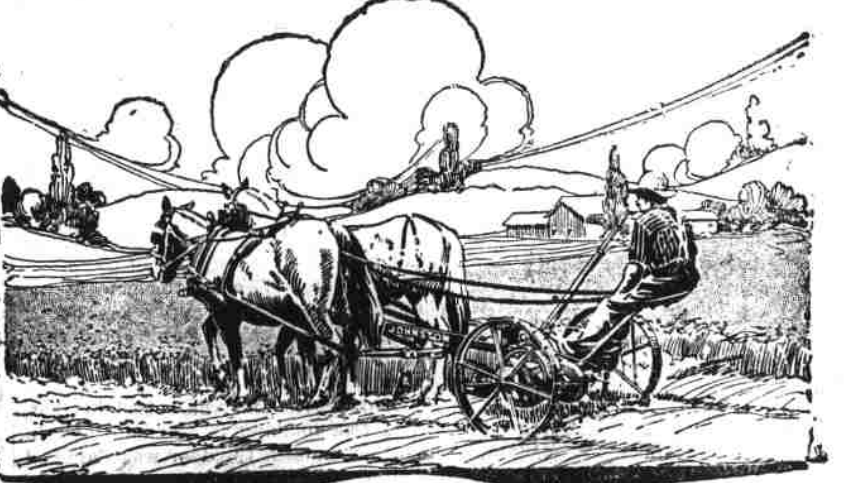
