CITY OF NEW BERN, N. C., \$20,000 6 PER CENT. 3 YEAR BONDS FOR SALE.

Sealed bids will be received at the office of the undersigned, in New Bern, N. C., until 12 o'clock, noon, Wednesday, 22nd day of October, 1913, for the purchase of twenty thousand dollars in coupon bonds issued by the City of New Bern, N. C., and payable three years after the first day of November, 1913, and subject to be called and paid off and discharged by the city after the first day of November, 1914, upon thirty days' notice to the holder thereof. Said bonds bearing interest at the rate of six per centum per annum, which said interest shall be payable semi-annually on the first days of November and May of each and every year at such place or places as may be agreed upon by and between the Board of Aldermen of said city and the purchaser of said bonds, so long as any of said bonds shall remain due and unpaid or uncalled. Said bonds to be of the denomination of not less than ten dollars nor more than one thousand dollars each, as may be determined by the Board of Aldermen, and shall bear on their face the words: "Issued for the legitimate necessary expenses of the City of New Bern." All the coupons thereon shall, after maturity, be receivable in payment of all taxes, debts, dues, licenses, fines and demands due the city, of any kind whatsoever, which shall be expressed on the face of said bonds. In all other respects the said bonds shall be in such form as may be agreed upon by and between the said Board of Aldermen and the purchaser thereof. Certified check for a sum equal to two per cent. of the amount of bond, bid for as evidence of good faith must be filed with bid. Bidders are invited to submit form of bonds and coupons to be used.
