THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN

(Continued from Yesterday.)
Fire Department.

Alderman S. H. Scott, Chairman. No report.

Water and Light Department.
W. B. Blades, Chairman.

Alderman Blades referred to the resolution previously passed to pay off some of the bills of this department, and further stated that the Department was at work on a scale of prices for water and light, and that this would probably be completed by the Recess meeting to be held Thursday night.

Streets and Pumps.

Alderman Ellis, Chairman, reported that the Rue Chapel Church and the blacksmith shop matter had been investigated thoroughly and it was found by the map made by the engineer and offered by Alderman Ellis at this meeting that both of the above places were located on City property.

Alderman Blades moved that the owners of these two pieces of property be notified to move both of them; that they were on the City property, giving them legal notice to vacate, and if they did not voluntarily vacate, that legal action be taken to urge them to move off the highways.

Alderman Disoway seconded the motion.

Motion carried.

Alderman Ellis stated that it was time something was being done in regard to tell rebuilding of the wharf at the foot of Pollock street in order that it be in good condition for the Fair.

Alderman Hyman moved that the matter of the wharf at the foot of Pollock street be referred to the wharves and Docks Committee with power to act if the cost of rebuilding does not exceed \$200.00, and report back at the next meeting.

Motion seconded and carried.

Alderman Satterthwaite reported that he had interviewed Mr. C. B. Moore in reference to the "Gem," and he stated that his house had sixteen rooms; that his rates were \$2.00 per day for transient and \$40.00 by the month. Alderman Dawson moved that the license tax for Boarding Houses be fixed at a rate of \$25.00 for ten to twenty rooms and all over twenty rooms \$50.00.

Alderman Ellis seconded the motion.

Alderman Ellis seconded the motion. Motion carried.

It was reported that the matter of Mr. Cohen's license had been investigated and it was found he had two pool tables in the back of his establishment and two barber chairs in the front, and pays a tax of \$65.00. Alderman Hyman moved that he pay \$15.00 Barber Shop Tax and \$50.00 for pool tables.

Alderman Satterthwaite reported that he had investigated the Marine Railway operated by C. C. Stewart and that the hauling capacity was very small; that he makes about two hauls a week at about \$3.00, and he is State Agent, he says, for a Gasolene engine and his commission amounts to about \$7.00, his commission being 20 per cent., that he has one in stock at this time. His railway tax is assessed at \$40.00.

Alderman Satterthwaite recommended that he be subject to tax for selling engines of \$10.00 and \$10.00 for Marine railway.

Alderman Ellis moved that all Marine Railways of a capacity of anything up to 10 tons be taxed \$10.00 and anything above ten tons \$50.00.

Alderman Hyman moved that the tax card for L. H. Cannon, Contractor be stricken out, and that C. C. Stewart's and G. S. Spencer's cars for tax on marine railway be reduced to \$10.00.

Motion seconded and carried.

Alderman Blades moved that a warrant be issued for Hilton Rawlings & Co. for \$3,000.00 on account for the auditing work now being performed by them and a warrant for \$700.00 be issued to the Gaston Hotel for Board bill.


