## NEW SEAL OF STATE IS TO BE PURCHASED

THE ONE NOW IN USE AT RALEIGH IS VERY BADLY WORN

Raleigh, N. C., March 21.—Secretary of State J. Bryan Grimes and Governor Craig are cooperating in the purchase of a new Great Seal of State for the Governor's office. The Great Seal now in use is badly worn and the mechanism by which it is operated in attaching the seal to documents of State is badly out of "whack". The instrument was broken during the administration of Governor Russell and was somewhat crudely repaired.

Also some of the letters have become so badly worn it show up poorly in the imprints. The present seal has been in use since 1883. The seal that was in use prior to that in 1794 then there were a number of colonial seals. Drawings of new seals have been received from a number of manufacturers.

**Who Knows This Agent**  
Commissioner of Insurance James R. Young is anxious to ascertain the whereabouts of G. E. Graves, who has been soliciting business and collecting the fees for the General Accident Insurance Co., without any State license and without the knowledge or authority of the company. He has been operating principally in Raleigh and vicinity.

Commissioner Young of the Insurance Department has procured judgment against the bondsmen of W. T. Brooks, at Monroe, who is under charge of burning a cotton storage house for the insurance on the cotton and has forfeited his bond of \$400. At this time a general search is being made for the fugitive with the intention of yet bringing him to trial.

**Young Issues Warning**  
A warning is sent out by the state Department of Insurance against the North American Home Insurance Co., operating from Roanoke, Va., which the commissioner says is not licensed to do business in this State and for this reason its contracts are null and void under the North Carolina laws.  
**Commissions Issued**  
Commission are issued by Adjutant General Young, of the North Carolina National Guard, to W. A. Barrow as captain, and to L. S. Bynum and W. B. Rea as first and second lieutenants for Company I, Second Regiment Edenton. Captain Barrow succeeds W. S. Privott, recently elected major in the Second Regiment.

## GOVERNMENT KEEPS OUT SHIPMENT OF SEED FROM EGYPT

(Special to the Journal.)  
Washington, D. C., March 21.—The Federation Horticultural Board has intercepted a shipment of cotton seed from Egypt which was found to be heavily infested by the so-called boll worm. This is the result against the quarantine against cotton seed which promulgated by the Board sometime ago. The seed which was intended for planting in Arizona arrived in Boston, where the customs officials, under instructions from the Board, obtained possession of it. The pink Boll worm is the most serious cotton pest in Egypt. In that country it does as much damage as the boll weevil in this country. The possibility of reducing the damage it causes has been considered by governmental commissions and conferences for several years. Like the boll weevil, it works, for the greater part of its existence, within the bolls. Frequently it makes its way inside the seeds

where it can live for an indefinite time. In fact, in experiments in the Ministry of Agriculture in Egypt it was found that the worms have lived for as long as seven months in seed in storage.

## WOULD NOT RETURN PRICE PAID WHEN ASKED TO DO SO

Dr. E. C. Hargett, city meat and milk inspector, has during the past few months learned a number of cases where spoiled meat has been sold to the local dealers in turn be sold by them to the public. The latest incident to this variety was reported to him a day or two ago by John Isler, colored.

Isler claimed that Nathaniel Weeks had sold him a hog which was unfit for food. Dr. Hargett made an examination of the carcass and told Isler to throw it a way at once and this was done. Isler then attempted to recover the amount paid for the meat from Weeks but the latter refused to refund the money and a warrant for his arrest was sworn out.

Weeks was given a hearing before Mayor Bangert yesterday afternoon and was found guilty of selling meat unfit for food. On account of this being his first offense, the defendant was allowed to go after he has paid the cost of the case and refunded the money Isler had paid him.

## ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF NEW BERN, THAT: it shall be unlawful for any Railroad Company or their employees to shift coal from one train to another or from one car to another on any of the Streets in the City of New Bern, and any one violating this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined the sum of \$25.00 for each and every offense. 3-6-5ti.

## ORDINANCE

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New Bern:—  
Section 1. That chapter 4 of the ordinances of the city be amended by adding at the end thereof the following:  
"Sec. 40. Whoever shall lay, throw or otherwise deposit, any paper or paste-board carton bag or box in the streets or on the sidewalks of the city shall be fined the sum of Two Dollars for each offense." 5-ti.

## ORDINANCE

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New Bern:—  
Sec. 1. That chapter 5 of the ordinances of the city be amended by adding at the end thereof the following:  
"Sec. 31. That it shall be unlawful for any person to drive any buggy, carriage, transfer, wagon, automobile or any other vehicle, on that portion of Queen street between Griffin street and Hancock street and between the iron posts supporting the shed of the Union Station and the railroad track, while a train of railroad cars or engine shall be on the track on Queen street between Griffin and Hancock streets. Whoever violates this ordinance shall be fined the sum of Five Dollars for each and every offense." 5 ti.

## ORDINANCE

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF NEW BERN THAT: SECTION 30 of Chapter 4 of the Ordinances of the City of New Bern be amended to read as follows:  
No freight cars shall be shifted and no freight train shall be made up on Queen Street in the City of New Bern west of the eastern line of Graves st., except between the hours of 6:30 to 8:30 A. M., 10 to 11:30 A. M. and from 3 to 5 P. M. Nor shall said street west of said eastern line of Graves Street be used for shifting freight cars or operating a train of freight cars for that purpose or for the purpose of making up freight trains except between the hours of 6:30 to 8:30 A. M. 10 to 11:30 A. M. and 3 to 5 P. M., and that the crossing of Queen at Griffith and Graves Street shall not be blocked at any one time over five minutes, and the Railroad Company shall have a flagman at the Griffith Street crossing during the shifting hours.  
Every person so engaged in doing or performing any of the acts forbidden by this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be fined \$50.00 for each offense. 3-6-5ti.
