WERE INTERCEPTED BY REBELS NEAR TORREON AND KILL-ED TO LAST MAN.

Eagle Pass Tex. March 31.—Re-fugees who reached Piceras Negras Mex. from the vicinity of Monclova today reported that General Murgia's command of constitutionalists had intercepted severlal bands of fugitive federal volunteers from Torreon and killed them to the last man. No estimate was given of the casualties.

Murgia is operating between Monterey and Torreon and is reported to have isolated the Torreon garrison from all communications with Mexico City and Saltillo.

There has been no communication between Eagle Pass and Torreon over the government telegraph line for five days. All railroads into Torreon from the east have been cut. General Joaquin Mass who went to reinforce General Velasco at Torreon made the trip overland in armored automobiles with his 800 men.

Murgia commands a strong force of onstitutionalists which while taking no part in the attack on Torreon has no part in the attack on Forreon has been working to prevent any assistance reaching the Federals in the beleagured city.
