Frank B. Wickersham Of Pennsylvania To Pay New Bern A Visit

Will Deliver An Address

Will Arrive In The City Next Tuesday—Other Prominent Men Coming

The local members of the Royal Arcanum are looking forward with much anticipation to the visit to this city next Tuesday of Supreme Regent, Frank B. Wickersham of Pennsylvania, who is to pay a visit to the local council, and also to the council at Wilmington.

Supreme Regent Wickersham, besides standing high in rank in the Royal Arcanum, is considered one of the best orators in the State of Pennsylvania and on Tuesday night he will deliver an address to the Royal Arcanum and also to the public at the Court House.

The subject of this address has not been announced but it will be a timely topic and those who will attend have a rare treat in store for them. There will be a number of other prominent visiting members of the order present. Among these will be E. Howell Way, of Waynesville and Frank W. Hancock of Oxford, Supreme Representatives; C. A. Johnson of Raleigh, Grand Regent and H. E. Bonitz of Wilmington, Grand Secretary.

Each of these gentlemen, who are well known in New Bern, will take part in the exercises to be held in the Court House, and will also participate in the oyster roast and social session which is to be held at the Council hall corner Broad and Hancock streets, after Mr. Wickersham's address.

As evidence of the fact that the local council is one of the largest and most important in the State, it has been announced that Supreme Regent Wickersham will only visit this city and Wilmington.

At the latter city the lodge is not quite as large as the one in New Bern. This order has become extremely popular during the past few years and additions are constantly being made to the local council.

IMPRISONED AMERICANS FREED BY MEXICANS

PHYSICIAN AND THREE OTHERS ARE TURNED OUT OF GREASER JAIL

Juarez, March 31.—No reports from General Villa were received this forenoon, and it was said that fighting at Torreon continued.

Washington, March 31.—Dr. Lambert, an American physician, arrested by Mexican authorities at Los Mochis after a constitutional officer upon whom he had performed an operation had died, has been released as the result of the energetic action of Secretary Daniels.

On the recommendation of the vice consul at Nogales, Mr. Daniels ordered Rear Admiral Howard to send a warship to Topolobampo. The cruiser New Orleans steamed at once, and Dr. Lambert was released.

Charge O'Shaughnessy reported the release of three Americans, Goldschmidt, Donohue and Crosswaite, held on charges of aiding the rebels. Huerta freed them.

Though the constitutionalists heretofore have been fairly successful in maintaining order in Sonora, raiding and pillaging by marauders are reported.

Continued ill health of Mr. O'Shaughnessy has made some assistance necessary and Warren D. Robbins, of Massachusetts, has been selected to act as second secretary. His nomination will be sent to the Senate soon. Mr. Robbins was attached to the legations at Lisbon and Buenos Aires before his services at Paris.

FUGITIVE FEDERALS CAUGHT AND KILLED

WERE INTERCEPTED BY REBELS NEAR TORREON AND KILLED TO LAST MAN.

Eagle Pass Tex. March 31.—Refugees who reached Piedras Negras, Mex. from the vicinity of Monclova today reported that General Murguia's command of constitutionalists had intercepted several bands of fugitive federal volunteers from Torreon and killed them to the last man. No estimate was given of the casualties.

Murguia is operating between Monterey and Torreon and is reported to have isolated the Torreon garrison from all communications with Mexico City and with Federal forces at Monterey and Saltillo.

There has been no communication between Eagle Pass and Torreon over the government telegraph line for five days. All railroads into Torreon from the east have been cut. General Joaquin Mass who went to reinforce General Velasco at Torreon, made the trip overland in armored automobiles with his 800 men.

Murguia commands a strong force of constitutionalists which while taking no part in the attack on Torreon has been working to prevent any assistance reaching the Federalists in the beleaguered city. He recently captured Monclova, confiscating large supplies in the railroad warehouses there and proceeding south and communication with Monterey from Piedras Negras at Espinazo, 10 miles above Reata a junction point leading to both Monterey and Torreon.

He then is reported to have burned several bridges on railroads which have been carrying supplies to both places.

Numerous small bands of constitutionalists are active around Monterey.

DIED AT INSPECTION

National Guardsman at Gaston's N. C. Drops and Expires.

Charlotte N. C. March 31.—While the Gastonia company of the North Carolina National Guard was being inspected in the vicinity of that place last night, a member of the company died.

FORT BARNWELL MEN WANT LAW ENFORCED

With This End In View They Form "Law And Order League" And Start On The Trail Of The "Blind Tigers" Several Were Caught.

Knowing that whiskey was being sold in that section, a number of the citizens of Fort Barnwell, Craven county, a few days ago formed a "Law and Order League" and went out on the warpath after the "tigers" with the result that several of them were captured.

The Journal yesterday received the following communication in regard to the formation of this league and of the raid on the liquor sellers:

Fort Barnwell, March 31. Editor: Journal: For a very long time the illicit sale of liquor has been practiced in and around Fort Barnwell, and for a long time our good people have tried every persuasive power to put a stop to this lawlessness; finding this to be impossible, a band composed of some of the best law abiding citizens of our community banded together and agreed the situation had become unbearable and determined to put a stop to the sale of "blind tiger" whiskey in our Burg, by having the law enforced, and with this determination went out and in a few hours captured several of these unfortunate "tigers." The result of which was the formation of a "Law Order League" through which we hope to lift our fallen brothers on a higher plane and encourage them to be law abiding citizens, thereby setting better example and train their boys to be law abiding God-fearing citizens.

The following is the resolution of the "Law and Order League" and the names of the members:

We, the undersigned citizens of Fort Barnwell Preinct in Mass Meeting Assembled; Resolved that we, are opposed to the sale of "Blind Tiger" liquor, and the illicit sale of wine and other intoxicating drinks; and we pledge ourselves to use all lawful means to prevent it; that we will from this day report all cases, and turn over to the officers of the law all information and evidence; and will insist that all violators from this date be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.

It is the intention of the "Law and Order League" to break up the sale of intoxicants in and around Fort Barnwell and it is believed that this will be done.

The contractor who has in charge the work of erecting this building, will begin operations at once and the new building will be completed and in readiness for occupancy by the opening of the Fall term.
