REACHES JUARE

State Of Excitement At Report Of Villa's Victory.

RUMOR WAS UNCONFIRMED.

Various Telegrams Have Been Received by Officials, But Nothing Authentic.

Juarez, Mexico, April 1.- This city was thrown into a state of high excitement late today when it was reported that Torreon had fallen, but the report failed of verification or denial.

Rebel officers telegraphed to Gomez Palacio, asking General Villa if the news were true. The operator there replied he was under orders to transmit no messages of any kind. General Carranza said he regretted that he sould not confirm the report, and others officials had the same reply.

The first report was that Marion Letcher, United States Consul at Chihaubau, had transmitted to W. J. Beyan Secretary of State, a report from George Carothers, Vice Consul, who has been at the front with Villa, that Torreon was captured at 1:30 o'clock this afternoon.
