**WAS NINETY-TWO YEARS OF
AGE—BODY CARRIED NORTH
FOR INTERMENT**

The funeral of Mrs. Laura A. Ives who died at the home of her son, Chas. L. Ives, Sunday morning, was conducted Sunday afternoon from the Presbyterian church by Rev. J. N. H. Summerell and the body was carried to Cheshire, Conn., for interment.

Mrs. Ives, who was nine-tweyears of age, had been ill only a few days, in fact only a week before she seemed to be in the heat of health and her death was a shock to relatives and friends. The deceased was the widow of the late Luther Ives and was the mother of Charles L. and George N. Ives of New Bern and Mrs. E. C. Guipe of Chicago, Ill.

**STATEMENT FROM SOLICITOR
CHARLES L. ABERNETHY**

**TO THE DEMOCRATIC VOTERS
OF THE FIFTH JUDICIAL DISTRICT**

I take this method of bringing certain matters to the attention of the attention of the Democratic voters of the Fifth Judicial District relative to my candidacy for the re-nomination for Solicitor.

My official duties keep me so engaged in Court that I have no opportunity to make a personal canvass, and I will be almost constantly in Court prosecuting the criminal docket from now until the primaries and the precinct meetings on the 16th of May, and consequently will have to rely upon my supporters and friends to look out for my interests during the campaign.

I desire to be re-nominated and re-elected because I wish the office, and for the further reason that I desire that my official record in the conduct of the office of Solicitor shall be approved by the people.

I have necessarily created antagonisms since I have been in the office by reason of vigorous prosecutions in the Courts. I sincerely trust that these influences will not be sufficient to encompass my defeat.

I am submitting my claims to the Democratic voters of this District solely on my record as a public official. I feel that I have faithfully served the interests of the State and for that reason should be re-nominated.

I call upon the Democrats who are in favor of my re-nomination to attend the primaries and precinct meetings and to see to it that whatever strength I may have in the primaries and in the primaries and precinct meetings in the

various counties of the district shall be taken and recorded in the said primaries and precinct meetings to the end that the same may be certified by the chairman or presiding officer and secretary of the precinct meeting to the County Convention, so that I may receive such strength as I may have in the District Convention.

It seems now assured that I will be re-nominated. The only way by which I can be defeated is for the interests and influences fighting my re-nomination to get out candidates in various counties and secure the delegates from the counties by such means, and combine against me and encompass my defeat in that manner. To prevent this my friends and supporters must be vigilant at the primaries and precinct meeting in the District, regardless of local conditions and influences, and see to it that my strength be recorded in each precinct meeting regardless of whether that strength is great or small, and to see to it that delegates friendly to me are selected to attend the various County Conventions to represent that strength in accordance with the plan of organization.

I sincerely trust that the fact that I will be compelled to be in attendance upon my duties as Solicitor and therefore unable to make an active personal canvass of the district, that the people of the district will understand this, and see to it that my interests do not suffer at the various precinct and primary meetings and County and District Conventions.

**FRENCH SOCIETY WOMAN SHOTS
HER SISTER IN A PUBLIC STREET**

**Uproaids Girl For Creating Family Discord and Fires
Five Bullets Into Her Body—Refers to
Calmette Affair**

Nantes, France, April 13.—A sensational shooting affray, in which a young society woman was probably mortally wounded by her sister, caused tremendous excitement today. Mlle. Genevieve De La Fleuraye, of the Chateay Rocheguyon at Saventierres, was shot five times by her sister, Mlle Marie La Fleuraye.

The tragedy occurred in the street when the sisters chanced to meet. After upbraiding her sister for causing discord in the family Mlle. Marie suddenly drew a revolver and began

firing on her sister. An immense crowd gathered and threatened to lynch the shooter, but she was rescued by the police and arrested.

Mlle. Genevieve was taken to the hospital in a dying condition.

At the police station Mlle. Marie, who is thirty years old, made reference to the recent killing of Editor Calmette by Mlle. Calliaux in Paris, and the authorities believe that she was influenced by that tragedy.

New Bern was rendered and the church was crowded to its utmost capacity.

At the Christian church Sunday night a special Easter program was rendered by all the children and this was also well attended.

The Easter service Sunday afternoon given by the children of Christ Episcopal church, was, as usual, largely attended and proved as thoroughly entertaining and enjoyable as those held in the past. Taken as a whole the day was most fittingly observed here.
