MANY PARCEL(POST PACKAGES FROM NEW BERN

TWO THOUSAND AND ELEVEN SENT OUT FROM APRIL FIRST TO FIFTEENTH.

The parcel Post department of the United States Mail, is not only a great convenience for the people of the country, but is a paying proposition for the government. The parcel post is yet in its infancy, being just a little over a year old, but the number of packages shipped by this method is surprisingly large, and continues to grow larger. There were two thousand and eleven packages mailed at the New Bern post office during the first fifteen days of this month, the amount of postage required for the transportation of these packages was \$162.25. The two thousand and eleven packages do not include those mailed to New Bern from other towns, it includes only those mailed at the local Post Office.

Many people, when they try the parcel post the first time, express astonishment at the low rates. For instance, packages not exceeding four ounces in weight can be sent any where regardless of distance, at one cent per ounce. Heavier packages in the local zone are five cents for the first pound and one cent for each additional two pounds; in the first and second zones, a radius of 150 miles, five cents or the first pound and one cent for each additional pound; in the third zone, 300 miles, six cents for the first pound and two cents for each additional pound, in the first each additional pound, in the fourth zone, 600 miles, seven cents for the first pound and four cents for each additional pound; in the fifth zone 1000 miles, eight cents for the first pound and six cents for each additional pound; in the sixth zone, 1,400 miles, nine cents for the first pound and seven cents for each additional pound; in the seventh zone, (—) miles, eleven cents for the first pound and ten cents for each additional pound; in the eighth zone including all United States possessions twelve cents a pound.

Packages are insured up to \$25 in value for an additional fee of five cents or to \$50 for ten cents. Package, can be sent C. O. D. by adding a fee of ten cents to the postage, this fee also covering insurance.

Packages weighing as much as five pounds are accepted for the first and second zones, while the weight is limited to twenty pounds to all other zones. The privilege has also been extended to embrace numerous articles that at first were restricted from these low rates.
