

## MAYOR BANGERT HAD BIG DOCKET MONDAY

### LARGE NUMBER OF OFFENDERS LINED UP BEFORE THE BAR OF JUSTICE

Arthur Hill, colored, was arraigned before Mayor Bangert at Police Court Monday afternoon, on a charge of being disorderly in the city limits. The charge being for whipping his sister to which he pleaded not guilty. After hearing the evidence the Mayor rendered a verdict of guilty and fined him ten dollars and the cost. Hill swore out a warrant for two of his sisters Ellen and Addie charging them with being disorderly. Addie was discharged and Ellen taxed with the cost. Louise Bell was also charged with disorderly conduct to which she pleaded guilty and was taxed with the cost. Judgment was suspended on payment of the cost in the case against Ben Jenkins colored, charged with being disorderly. Mollie Roberson and John Evans, both colored were taxed with the cost for being disorderly in the city limits.

There was only one state case before the Mayor yesterday afternoon, this was against Henry Peele, colored for resisting an officer. Chief Lupton received a message yesterday morning that there was a man raising a lot of disturbance near Smith Town and when reached on the scene he told the man to consider himself under arrest, but Peele told him he would die before he would go to jail and had to be carried. He was bound over to the June term of Superior Court under a justified bond of one hundred dollars, which he was unable to pay and was placed in the county jail.

Judgment was suspended on payment of the cost in the case against Rachel Harris colored, for being disorderly in the city limits.

The case against John Manly for not complying with the sanitary laws of the city was continued until tomorrow afternoon at two o'clock. Annahias Chapman, and Lena Dillahunt, colored were taxed with the cost for not complying with the sanitary laws of the city.

On complaint made by Dr. Hargett, the city health inspector, a warrant was sworn out against Arnold Brothers for bottling milk on the streets in the city. There not being sufficient evidence for conviction they were discharged. Willie Barnes was taxed with the cost for not blowing his horn before crossing the street on a motorcycle.

He asked the board for a donation of fifty dollars. The matter was referred to some time later.

At a previous meeting a petition was presented to the board by some of the citizens of Core Creek asking that the road leading from Cove City to Dover be changed to the South side of the Norfolk Southern railroad and run with the railroad only a short distance from it. The board granted this petition yesterday and the work of ditching will commence at an early date.

Dr. Pollock, the county coroner, tendered his resignation yesterday stating that his practice requires all of his time. His resignation was accepted and Dr. Walter Watson was elected to fill the unexpired term.

Commissioner N. M. Lancaster also tendered his resignation and C. J. Heath, of number one township was

sworn in to fill the unexpired term. The board adjourned to meet Thursday and the matter of enlarging the Court House will be disposed of at that time.

## CHAMBER OF COMMERCE WILL GIVE ASSISTANCE

### GRANT REQUEST OF J. LEON WILLIAMS TO AID IN BIG CELEBRATION

Just at this time the finances of the organization are at low ebb and, although the members would have liked very much to grant the request, it was deemed best to postpone any action for the time being.

President Charles L. Ives who recently headed a committee which went to Richmond, Va., to secure tobacco buyers for the new warehouse to be operated in this city reported on their success in securing several buyers and assured the organization that these men would come up to all expectations.

An invitation to become a member of the National Association of Chambers of Commerce, was acted upon favorably and the local organization is now affiliated with that body.

## FUNERAL SHIP LEFT VERA CRUZ SUNDAY

### BODIES OF SEVEN MARINES ARE BEING BROUGHT HOME.

Vera Cruz, May 4.—The bodies of 17 American bluejackets and marines killed in the street fighting during the operations accompanying the occupation of Vera Cruz by the United States fleet, started on their way to New York Sunday on board the cruiser Montana. Solemn honors were paid by the great assemblage of United States and foreign war vessels as the Montana departed.

The crews of the warships in full uniform lined the sides of the warships and as the Montana reached each one, the men stood at attention, the marine guards presented arms and the ship's bands played. One by one, the colors of the fighting crafts sank to half-mast as the Montana passed through a lane formed by divisions of the Atlantic fleet.

On shore during the Montana's passage out of the harbor, the flag over Brigadier General Frederick Funston's headquarters was half masted and was only raised again when the vessel had on the horizon.
