FEDERAL PRISONER'S LONG TERM IS CUT DOWN

TWENTY YEARS SENTENCE HAS BEEN CHANGED TO FIVE YEARS.

(Special to the Journal.)

Atlanta, Ga., May 7.—On application of Attorney P. C. McDuffie, the twenty-year sentence of John Morgan, who is imprisoned in the United States Federal Penitentiary here, has been commuted by President Wilson to five years' actual service. The President's action will entitle Morgan to his liberty not later than June, 1915, with a possible allowance for good conduct.

John Morgan was convicted after a plea of not guilty in the United States District Court for the Northern District of Alabama, for criminal conspiracy in connection with the assassination of a revenue officer. At the time the case attracted considerable attention throughout the country, as Morgan's part, in the words of the presiding judge, consisted "in telephoning information of the approach of the officers to parties, said to be his friends, who were lying in wait for them."

His counsel was able to secure from Judge W. I. Grubb, who presided at the trial, a letter in which the judge stated that there was an element of doubt as to the identification of Morgan's voice over the phone. That fact, together with the severity of his original sentence, caused the President to take favorable action on the application. Morgan has made a model prisoner and the commutation was secured with the approval of Warden Moyer.

ULTIMATUM TO HAITI

MUST PAY HER SUBJECT FOR LOSS SUSTAINED BY FIRE

(Special to the Journal)

PORT AU PRINCE, HAITI, May 7.—The British diplomatic representative at Port au Prince today delivered an ultimatum to the Haitien government demanding the immediate payment of an indemnity of \$62,000 to a British subject in compensation for the loss of his saw mill during the Leconte revolution.

The British demand is supported by the presence here of the British cruiser Suffolk. The payment of this sum of money to the British subject in question, a man named Peters, had previously been ordered by a court of arbitration.

The chamber of deputies and the senate considered the British demand in a joint session marked by a great excitement. There are no funds in hand with which to make the payment.

WASHINGTON, May 7.—Upon request of the American State Department, British Ambassador Spring-Rice today cabled the British foreign office a suggestion that time be allowed for inquiry into the Haitien difficulty before and drastic measures were carried out.

The State Department asked suspension of the ultimatum until it had informed itself of the basis of the British claim and the reasons of British authorities for bringing the matter to an immediate issue.
