Defeated General Felix Robertson Of Texas-Richmond Gets Next Reunion

FORREST CAVALRYMEN READY

W. W. Old, Jr., of Norfolk Leads Fight Against Petition for Federal Pension Bill

JACKSONVILLE, FLA., May 8-Seneral Bennett H. Young, of Louisville, Ky., yesterday was re-elected commander in chief of the United Confederate Veterans at the annual re-union here. Richmond, Va., was chosen for the 1915 re-union. General Young deteated General Felix Robertson of Texas.

After the election of a commander in chief adjournment was taken until today when officers of the Army of Tennesse and of the Ar ny of Virginia and other divisional organization were elected. General Young received approximately 1100 votes and General Robertson 800. Texas cast its entire 343 votes for Robertson.

Offer Their Services.

One hundred survivors of General forrest's famous cavalry today offered their services to President Wilson in the event of war with Mexico. The ollowing resolution was adopted:

"We read with indignation of repeated insults offered to American citizens by Mexicans and imbued with the pare triotism derived as a heritage from our ancestors we hereby tender his Excelency, the President of the United States, if called upon, a company of one hundred men to be selected from

"We assure him that they will be able to fully fulfill their duties and bear the hardships that will be required of regular soldiers. We hereby guarantee to be among the first to plant the American flag on the battlements of Mexico City, or any other fertress within her

onded when W. W. Old, Jr., com-nander-in-chief of the organization, left his official chair in order to make a speech denouncing it. "I am willing to take my coat off

and work for funds with which to supply our Confederate soldiers," he declared, "and until we are no longer able to do so we should not ask the government to help them." The speaker was heartily cheered as

he asserted that the had consulted hundreds of Virginia Veterans and found none who was in favor of beseeching aid from the government.

Delegates from Georgia, Florida and South Carolina voiced disapproval of the resolution.

Speeches against it were only checked by the adoption of a motion to enter into the election of officers in five minutes. Before that time had elapsed the resolution was tabled by an overwhelming vote.
