

# SHRINERS GATHER IN CITY OF ATLANTA

## THIRTY THOUSAND NOBLES ON HAND TO JOIN IN CEREMONIES.

Atlanta, Ga., May 11.—More than thirty thousand Nobles of the Mystic Shrine are here today for the annual convocation. Most of them have brought their wives and families and the city is crowded. There are prominent men from every State in the union.

The city has been transformed for the occasion. By permission of the Mayor and city council the local entertainment committee, headed by Potentate Forrest Adair, of Yaarab Temple, has taken full control for the time of the whole street lighting system of Atlanta.

White globes with the Shriners' emblems have been substituted for the top globes of the electric light clusters throughout the heart of the city and there are electric arches and other decorative effects.

The elaborate social functions include a grand ball in the Auditorium-Armory on both evenings of the convention. There is to be a barbecue at which tables will be spread beneath the trees for the accommodation of from 3,000 to 5,000 persons.

The Piedmont and Ainsley hotels have both been set aside in their entirety for the convention and California, which has arrived in four beautifully appointed trains, a thousand strong has engaged four floors of the Kimball House and changed the name for the week to "Hotel California." The Californians are touring the country in the hope of attracting the convocation of 1915 to their city, in which case it will be a feature of the Panama Pacific Exposition.

There will be two parades, on Tuesday morning at 9 o'clock forming an official escort for the imperial potentate and members of the imperial council from the hotel to the place of meeting.

The second parade is to be at 8 o'clock Wednesday evening. In their parade not only members of the patrols and bands, but all the Shriners as well will take part, wearing full evening dress with red fez. The Tuesday parade will be three or four miles long. The Wednesday night parade will be seven or eight miles long. There will be between sixty and seventy-five bands playing at one time in these parades.

### CARRIED TO WILMINGTON

#### Alleged Retailer To Be Tried There.

Moses Jones, colored, who was arrested by U. S. Deputy Marshal C. H. Ange at Jacksonville, a few days ago on a charge of retailing spirituous liquors without a Government License, and bowed over by Commissioner Hargett, of Jacksonville, to the next term of Federal Court under a three hundred dollar bond, has been transferred to the Wilmington District. Deputy Marshal Ange carried Jones to Wilmington yesterday where he will be placed on trial this week.

Jones was employed by the Atlantic Coast Line Railway Company as fireman, and he is alleged to have sold whiskey from Wilmington to New Bern. He concealed his "booze" in the tender of the engine, and when the train made its stops he would get off the engine and apply his waiting friends with the coveted goods.

# YOUTHFUL MURDERER WILL FACE JURY

## JEAN GIANINI EATS AND SLEEPS WELL DESPITE IMPENDING DOOM.

Herkimer, N. Y., May 12.—An effort will be made today to complete the jury that is to try Jean Gianini, seventeen on the charge of murdering his benefactress and former teacher at the Poland, N. Y., Public School, Miss Lida L. Beecher. An extra panel of forty talemen have been drawn. Of the eleven jurors in the box only one is unmarried.

During the examination of talesmen frequent reference has been made to Chester Gillett's case. Young Gillett murdered Miss Grace Brown of South Otselec, Chenango County, at Big Moose, in the Adirondacks, in the summer of 1906. He was found guilty here the following fall and a year later paid the penalty with his life. He made a confession. Young Gianini now occupies the cell where Gillette was a prisoner, and Charles D. Thomas, now associated with the Gianini prosecution, was chief counsel for Gillette.

Gianini eats and sleeps well, smokes his pipe, reads magazines, and apparently is unmoved. His walk is his only marked peculiarity. This is an angle-kneed stride that swings his body low on the hips.

Gianini's father never misses a session of court. He aids in the selection of the men who will decide his son's fate. Mr. Gianini displays some nervousness.

John F. McIntyre of New York, chief attorney for the defense, said today there would be testimony concerning the ancestry of his client with reference to his mental status in an effort to prove the boy is mad.

It will be two or three weeks before the case is submitted to the jury.

# ARRANGING FOR THE EDITORS CONVENTION

## N. C. PRESS ASSOCIATION TO GATHER AT WRIGHTSVILLE NEXT MONTH.

Wilmington, May 12.—Arrangements are now being made for the annual convention of the North Carolina Press Association which will be held at Wrightsville Beach June 24th and 25th. The association met at the beach five years ago and the members enjoyed their stay so much that they are delighted at the opportunity to return to the resort for another sojourn of a few days. The attendance is expected to reach 300 or 400, including members of the families of the newspaper men.

Mr. J. B. Sherrill, of Concord, secretary of the association, has just mailed to all members of the association a circular letter relative to transportation. It is announced that arrangements will be made for a Pullman car to be attached to the Seaboard train leaving Charlotte at 5 p. m. Tuesday, June 23rd, and to run through to Wilmington. Those coming from the east via Raleigh and the Seaboard may take this car at Hamlet.

Secretary Sherrill announces that President Clarence Poe, of Raleigh, is at work on the program and will make an announcement of it in a short time.

The local newspaper men will likely hold a meeting within a few days to outline plans for the entertainment of the visitors. There will be a number of pleasing features. It is likely that they will include a Dutch supper, trip down the river to Fort Caswell and Southport and an automobile trip to some of the splendid roads of New Jersey county.
