**IMPORTANT NOTICE TO CRAVEN COUNTY TEACHERS**

The attention of those teachers who have not enrolled in the Teachers Institute now being conducted in Vanceboro is directed to Section 4167 of the School Law.

The law is as follows: "All public school teachers of the state and all high school and graded school teachers are hereby required to attend biennially some county teachers institute or accredited summer school continuously for a term not less than two weeks unless providentially hindered; and failure so to attend such summer school or institute shall be cause for debarring any teacher so failing from teaching in any of the public schools, high schools or graded schools of the state until such teacher shall have attended, as required by law, some county institute or accredited school as herein provided for."

This law will be enforced and you are advised to enroll at once in the school now being conducted by Dr. Highsmith and Miss Harris at Vanceboro.

**CHECKERS IS IT**

**NEW LIGHTS FOR RIVER**

**WILL BE PLACED AS SOON AS FUNDS ARE ADAPTABLE FOR PURPOSE**

Some months ago petitions were sent to Senator Simmons requesting the establishing of beacon lights in Neuse river. One of the entrance to Hancock's Creek and also one off the entrance of Slocumb Creek, which it is believed will serve the navigation of the waters in that vicinity.

Senator Simmons presented the petitions to the Bureau of Lighthouses in the Department of Commerce. The commissioner has advised Senator Simmons that the matter has been carefully investigated, and when funds become available for the purpose, measures will be taken to establish a light off the entrance of Hancock's Creek and one off the entrance of Slocumb Creek. The Bureau is of the opinion that the present light located off Wilkinson's Point meets the requirements of navigation in the locality of Cherry Point, as vessels on the river at night, by passing reasonably near the Wilkinson's Point light, will clear Cherry Point shoal.
