Alderman Satterthwaite seconded the motion. Motion carried.

**ORDINANCE AND LICENSE COMMITTEE.**—Alderman Satterthwaite, chairman, no report.

Alderman Ellis, here made the request that the Mayor instruct the Police to ascertain the names of the money lenders in the city, and see how many have license and how many have not.

**CEMETERY COMMITTEE.**—Alderman Disoway, chairman, reported that the Pony Mower is here, and in use, and that same cost \$70.00. Alderman Disoway, offered the following quarterly report.

Alderman Satterthwaite, moved that the foregoing report be accepted, and spread upon the minutes.

Motion seconded and carried.

**RAILROAD COMMITTEE.**—Alderman Ellis, here stated that he over looked a matter under the Streets and Pumps Committee: that of re-surfacing East Front Street, and lower Pollock Street, from Craven to East Front St.

Alderman Satterthwaite moved that the matter be referred to the Streets and Pumps Committee for investigation, and report back at the next meeting. Alderman Scott seconded the motion.

Alderman Blades offered the following amendment: That the Clerk be instructed to insert an advertisement in the two local papers for re-surfacing East Front Street, and lower Pollock Street.

Motion seconded, and carried.

Alderman Ellis, reported in the matter of the New Bern Ghent Street Railway Company, that the Committee recommended that no privilege be granted to any Street Railway Company to run freight cars on the streets of the City.

Alderman Hall, moved that the report of Committee be accepted, and spread upon the minutes.

Alderman Satterthwaite seconded the motion. Motion carried.

**RIVER AND HARBOR COMMITTEE.**—Alderman Satterthwaite, chairman, no report.

**PARK COMMITTEE.**—Alderman Hall, Chairman, no report.

**SANITARY COMMITTEE.**—Alderman Brinson, Chairman, nothing special to report, but the Committee requests further time in which to report the matter of the Slaughter House. No objection entered as to the foregoing request.

**POLICE DEPARTMENT.**—Alderman Dawson, Chairman, absent. Alderman Scott, reported that the uniforms for the Police Department has been delivered and were satisfactory.

Alderman Ellis, moved that on account of the efficiency in the faithful discharge of his duties that officer A. A. Ippock, be advanced to Policeman No. 1 with a salary of \$65.00 per month.

Alderman Satterthwaite seconded the motion.

Alderman Dill moved an amendment Ellis' motion that the salary of the policeman be raised \$5.00, all around.

The amendment receiving no second, all members voting in the affirmative, the motion made by Alderman Ellis was carried.

**WHARVES AND DOCK COMMITTEE.**—Alderman Satterthwaite, no report.

**CITY PROPERTY.**—Alderman Hall no report.

**UNFINISHED BUSINESS.**—No report.

**WATER AND LIGHT CONTINUED.**—Alderman Blades moved that an advertisement be inserted in the two local papers for ten days for furnishing 800 feet of 10 inch cast iron Bell, and Spigot C. A. "A" water pipe, 1 10 in. foot valve and 3 10 inch ells.

Alderman Satterthwaite seconded the motion.

All members voting in the affirmative, the motion was carried.

**NEW BUSINESS.**—Alderman Satterthwaite reported that his attention has been called to getting in and out of Duffy's Field since the extension of the Colored Cemetery caused by the blocking of the streets by the Railroad, stating that it appeared that the best thing to do would be to request the Railroad to refrain from blocking B Street.

Alderman Satterthwaite, moved that the city attorney be instructed to bring suit against the Railroad to proceed to

open up Guion Street, and B Street, giving the Railroad thirty days notice.

Alderman Blades seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Alderman Ellis moved the adoption of the following ordinance:  
Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New Bern:

Section 1.—That section 14 of Chapter 3 of the ordinances of the city be amended by adding at the end thereof, the following words: "Provided, this section shall not apply to electrically lighted signs erected and wired in accordance with the rules prescribed by the Southern Eastern Underwriters Association."

Motion seconded and upon roll call the same was adopted.

**STREETS AND PUMPS COMMITTEE CONTINUED.**—Alderman Ellis, moved that the Port Physician, Milk and Meat Inspector, and the two sanitary officers be notified to be present at the regular meetings in the months of May, June, July, August, September, and October.

Motion seconded and carried.

**CEMETERY COMMITTEE CONTINUED.**—Alderman Disoway reported that it was necessary to have about 100 markers for the graves in the colored cemetery, and requested that the Committee be authorized to act.

Alderman Satterthwaite moved that the Committee be empowered to act in the above matter.

Motion seconded and carried.

Alderman Disoway moved that the matter be referred to the Water and Light Committee with power to act.

Motion seconded and carried.

The following report of the Milk and Meat Inspector was offered:

New Bern, N. C., May 5, 1914.

To the Honorable Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the city of New Bern:

Gentlemen:  
I have the honor of submitting my report for the month of April 1914 as follows:

I have my restaurants shown on a percentage basis as I have the meat markets, and soda fountains and dairies.

We will first take the condition of the meat markets, which I visit every day, and I find them to be according to my judgment as follows:

Very little meat has been condemned this month. Some has been condemned at Castet's, but not on account of disease.

At Davis' about 50 pounds has been condemned, but not on account of disease.

Less meat this month has been condemned than any other month previous since I have been Inspector, in fact this is the first month that I have not found any diseased meat at all.

The Coast Line, at the Coast Line, I have found that he is keeping his market in a much better condition, and I think that he will in the future try and keep his market up to the standard.

At Frank's market, I find that he is making improvements on his building, and I think in a short while he will have it in a much better condition.

As I said before, you may know that a meat market cannot be kept like a parlor, and I do not expect them to keep it as such. I only ask that they be kept as clean as possible, and that
