LARGE FORCE OF MECHANICS ARE NOW EMPLOYED IN THIS WORK

OAK RIDGE, June 24.—Oak Ridge presents a scene of busy activity. Twenty-five or thirty men are at work on the new building, concreting foundation and laying brick.
