STAINED KNIFE IS NEW CLUE IN NELMS CASE

INNES MAKES CONVICTING STATEMENTS ABOUT LIGHT-TRAILER

ATLANTA, Sept. 15.—A hunting knife with an electric light, covered from tip to hilt with light-colored hair, was added to the evidence discovered in an attempt to connect Victor E. Innes and his wife of having been in the murder of Beatrice Nelms and Eloise Nelms Dennis, the daughters of Atlanta sisters.

Innes and his wife, in the custody of a deputy sheriff and Marshall Nelms, were asked at San Francisco to explain the presence of the weapon at the Innes ranch near Eugene, Ore., where the two were arrested several days ago.

Innes is reported to have made conflicting statements and finally to have refused to say anything more about it. After an investigation in San Francisco and Sacramento, the officers and detectives concluded on San Antoni with their prisoners.

Stains to be Examined.

The knife was found in a search of the Innes ranch for clues bearing on the disappearance of the Nelms sisters. It is in the possession of District Attorney Walter H. Evans, of Portland, and probably will be given a bacteriological examination to determine if the stains are those of human blood. The weapon was in a leather case.

This find, with the report of a Washington scientist, that the vertebrae dug up in the rear of the Innes "house of mystery" at No. 120 Wilkins avenue, San Antonio, are those of a human being, is regarded as one of the most important since the investigation began.

Case Rests on Bones.

The Washington expert said not only that the vertebrae are human bones, but that they are from the body of a woman.

Mrs. J. W. Nelms, mother of the missing girls, and those assisting her in her search, are relying largely on the finding of the bones to establish that one or both of the sisters have been slain. Unless this is done to the satisfaction of the court, the murder charge will fall through.

Two bottles containing toilet preparations used by Eloise, a handkerchief, a silk stocking and the burned hair of a shoe were other discoveries made at the house last week.

Iron Bank Account Found.

The investigation in San Francisco developed that Innes had opened an account in February at the main branch of the Hellman bank and Trust Company, Sixth and Main streets, and that he had made deposits there correspondent in amounts to the statements that were sent him by Eloise.

On February 17 he deposited \$297.30 and the amount sent him by Eloise a few days before. Two days later he deposited \$150. On March 2 he drew \$339 in the bank, the amount he had received from Eloise by a telegraphic money order. The largest deposit was April 25—\$1,100. It is not known whether he got his letter from Eloise from some other source. The account was closed July 1, shortly after the Nelms girls disappeared. It was subject to withdrawals either by Eloise or Mrs. Innes.

Innes gave his address as No. 147 Endome street, San Francisco, and it is known that Mrs. Innes was with him when he made some of the deposits. Marshal Nelms said, while sitting in San Francisco with Mr. and Mrs. Innes preparatory to taking them on the rest of their journey to Texas, that he had received more incriminating evidence against Innes and his wife than has been made public.

Evidence on Death Letter.

Nelms said the evidence concerned the letter supposed to have been sent by his sister, Mrs. Dennis, from San Francisco to Mrs. J. W. Nelms, his mother, in Atlanta, saying that she had killed Beatrice Nelms.

A new phase of the Nelms case developed when Nelms produced a letter dated August 20, at Eugene, Ore., purporting to have been written by Victor E. Innes to a physician of the same city, in which he said:

"Can you write me a strong letter showing that I am in a weakened condition and a physical wreck, and 'toil to travel?'"

Nelms said that the police of San Francisco have compared the signature that was signed to the letter with the writing of Innes, and that there is a strong similarity between the two, and that, in consequence, he believes that Innes wrote the letter and signed his name to it. Nelms said that he received a telegram from his mother today, saying that there had been additional evidence developed here.
