PRIMROSE AND WILSON PLEASED IN NORFOLK

WELL KNOWN MINISTRELS MADE A BIG HIT IN THE VIRGINIA CITY.

Primrose and Wilson's minstrels, which will be seen in New Bern next Tuesday night at the Masonic Theatre, appeared in one of the leading theatres at Norfolk a few days ago, and this is what the Ledger-Dispatch had to say about the show on the day following:

ARE INVESTIGATING THE SHOOTING OF SPANIARD

SLAYING OF FIVE OF KING MANUEL'S SUBJECTS IS BEING PROBED.

Madrid, (Via Paris.) Nov. 13.—The alleged shooting of five Spaniards by German soldiers at Liege and the bombardment of the Spanish consulate at Rheims were the subjects of a lively debate in the cortes today.

Deputy Santa Cruz declared that the government did nothing to protect Spanish subjects and said it was especially shameful that General Huerta, former provisional president of Mexico, should be permitted to come and live in Spain.

"The foreign minister, Eduardo Dato, in reply, stated that the German government had promised to investigate the Liege affair.

Deputy Soriano, replying to the foreign minister, said that this was not enough. In his opinion, Germany should be required to pay an indemnity.

CAPT. W. H. GASKILL DIES IN CARTERET

PASSED AWAY YESTERDAY MORNING AT HIS HOME IN MOREHEAD CITY.

Morehead City, N. C., Nov. 13.—Captain W. H. Gaskill, a much loved and highly respected citizen, died here suddenly this morning at 8:15 o'clock at the age of 57, a victim of valvular heart trouble.

For nineteen years Captain Gaskill was in charge of the United States Life Saving Station at Cape Lookout. About two years ago he was forced to retire from the service on account of his failing health. Last week he had lived with him, died and from this shock he never fully recovered.

He leaves a married daughter, Mrs. F. B. Hobson, Pocomoke City, Md., and two sons, Messrs. D. B. Gaskill, cashier of the Bank of Whiteakers, N. C., and Wm. H. Gaskill, Jr., a student at Drexel Institute, Philadelphia, Pa. The funeral services will be held from the Methodist church Sunday afternoon and will be in charge of the Masonic Fraternity of which he was a devoted member.
