Grants Awarded Local Doctors

Research grants totaling \$50,843 have been awarded staff members of the University School of Medicine by the U.S. Public Health Service. A grant of \$1728 was included for medical students for part-time research fellowships. All grants are for a period of one year.

The list follows with general subject matter and amount: Dr. Richard M. Peters, assistant professor of surgery, \$8000, pulmonary blood flow (the flow of blood through the lungs); Dr. Newton Fischer, assistant professor of surgery, \$3,999, surgical treatment of laryngeal paralysis of the vocal cords).

Dr. Kenneth M. Brinkhous, professor of pathology, \$15,938, hemophilia, a disease usually hereditary in which the victim has a tendency to bleed profusely, even from slight wounds, due to delayed clotting. Future commitments of grants for four additional years at \$16,000 per year were also made to continue this project.

Dr. John H. Ferguson, professor of physiology and Dr. Jessica H. Lewis, research associate in physiology, \$15,228, bleeding and clotting disorders. Special tests are performed to determine the cause of the bleeding including the bleeding in patients having hemophilia. This is the second year of a three year grant.

Dr. T. Z. Csaky, assistant professor of pharmacology, \$5,950, metabolism of sugar in the body with the use of chemical compounds closely related to sugars—and for study of behavior of these compounds in different metabolic processes with in the body.

The U. S. Public Health Service's Research Grants Program was established in 1946 with the view that "maximum progress could be achieved only if the scientists enjoyed freedom to ex-

periment without direction or interference." The announcement said that since the research grants program began, more than 9,000 grants have been made, amounting to over \$100,000,000 in research support to thousands of scientists in approximately 400 research institutions, located in every state in the Nation.

Chapel Hill Meeting Will Hear Discussion Of County Tax Dollar By McMahon, Lewis

Two local experts from the Institute of Government, Henry W. Lewis and J. Alexander McMahon, will speak on the challenging and timely topic, "The Orange County Tax Dollar: Its Source and Spending", at the first fall meeting of the League of Women Voters to be held at the Town Hall on Wednesday at 8 p. m.

Their presentation and the discussion to follow will open the League's local study for the year 1954-55, and will provide stimulus and information for the Workshop and Unit meetings to follow, beginning October 6. Mrs. Richmond P. Bond is Local Study Chairman and responsible for the September 29 meeting. President

of the League for the current year is Mrs. N. J. Demerath. Financial policy of local governmental units is the special interest of Mr. McMahon, while Mr. Lewis has made a thorough study of the source and administration of the property tax in North Carolina. Interested visitors are welcome, according to Mrs. N. J. Demerath, League president for the current year. The League this week received endorsement of its study as a matter of public service from R. J. M. Hobbs of Chapel Hill, for two years a member of the present three-man Board of County Commissioners, and from Collier Cobb Jr., who was for fourteen years a member of the Board.

Mr. Hobbs observed that slightly more money will be raised through property taxes this year than last, in spite of the lowered rate, because the Commissioners felt that the increased needs of education have made convincing demands on public funds. Mr. Hobbs pointed out that the same amount of tax money raised last year would have been forthcoming if the Commissioners had placed the tax rate at 60c per \$100, a possible procedure according to their declared purpose of equalizing rather than increasing the tax burden by the recent revaluation. He remarked further on the attention currently being given by the Commissioners to welfare problems of the County.

Mr. Cobb commented: "Every thinking person realizes the importance of knowing how your local tax money is spent; certainly this is a timely and important subject for the League of Women Voters to study."
