# Betty Bolton Going From Italy To Turkey

Miss Betty Bolton, who has been teaching in the Navy Dependents' School in Naples, Italy, will leave Monday for Ismir, Turkey. A native of Chapel Hill, she has been here visiting her mother, Mrs. R. L. Bolton.

Miss Bolton has been librarian at Sherman High School in Naples, a school for American children

whose parents are stationed with NATO, since 1953. She has also been teaching English. This year, however, she will go to a newer and smaller American school at Ismir.

Her duties will be approximately the same, but living will not be as easy. An example, Miss Bolton stated is that the only milk available will be of the powdered variety.

# Use Stateside Standards

"The dependent schools in Italy try to operate under the same standards as those in the States as much as possible," said Miss Bolton. "However, Italian is taught in all the elementary grades, and as much as possible is done to take advantage of interesting spots in the Naples area. Daytime trips are frequently arranged by the school, such as a recent one to Pompeii."

Miss Bolton has been living in an Italian apartment house, and most of her contact with the native population has been there. She has been studying the language in special conversation courses sponsored by the Navy, so she is now able to converse with some

fluency. Miss Bolton finds the Italians to be especially friendly people and quite ready to welcome the Americans.

The Navy schools are staffed with teachers from all over the United States. These people are flown home each summer and are returned to Europe in time for school each fall. During her vacations Miss Bolton has also had the time to tour Italy very extensively and also to travel to Austria, Paris, London, and Switzerland. Before going to Ismir she hopes to see Athens, Istanbul, and possibly the Holy Land.
