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Traffic Curbs Are Proposed By Planners

The Planning Board has proposed six specific steps to the board of aldermen as implementations of the recent preliminary traffic survey by planning consultant W. F. Babcock.

Presented to the aldermen on Monday, they are: (1) elimination of parking on Rosemary Street from the western town line to Boundary Street; (2) no parking on the first block of Hillsboro Street; (3) no parking on the east side of the first block of Henderson Street and 10-minute limit on the other side.

(4) No parking on Mallett Street; (5) no parking within 150 feet of the intersection of Pittsboro and McCauley Street; and (6) the erection of overhead turning lane directional signs on major streets where these lanes are now marked on the pavements.

These recommendations were made by the Planning Board in a letter to the aldermen as "some of the less costly traffic improvement proposals which would afford some immediate relief to the traffic situation."

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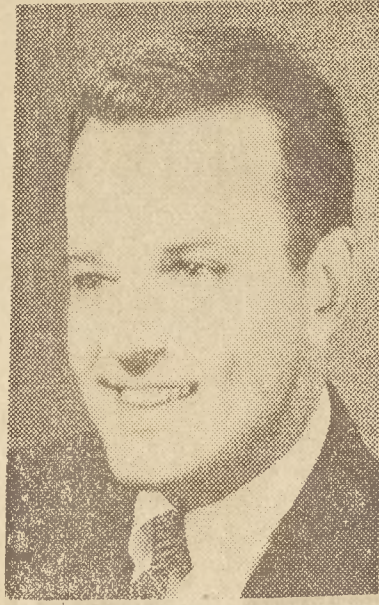

TV Program Directors Given Higher Positions

A change in title and authority for the heads of television activity at the Consolidated University has been approved by the executive committee of the University's Board of Trustees.

Duff Browne, Ralph Burgin, and David M. Davis, who have held the positions of program directors of WUNC-TV's studios at Chapel Hill, Raleigh and Greensboro, respectively, will now be directors of television at their individual institutions.

Robert S. Schenkkan was director of television for the Consolidated Office until his resignation last spring to join the University of Texas faculty as director of radio and television, professor of drama, and chairman of the radio-television curriculum. President Perks explains that Mr. Schenkkan is not being replaced, but his authority will be shared by the

three directors, and that activities of the station will be coordinated through the Consolidated Office.

Mr. Browne came to UNC from Fort Worth, Texas, where he operated his own firm as a television consultant, doing much work for the Federal Communications Commission. He started in television with WRGB, Schenectady, N. Y., General Electric's experimental TV station. He took a training program there and then became director.

Later he served with the radio and television department of the University of Miami, Fla., where he taught courses in production and also worked with the Miami TV station.

Mr. Alexander let the firemen in and they found a burned out refrigerator motor in the back of the store to be the cause of the smoke. There was no other damage to the store.
