The University athletic offices today issued information to students concerning football tickets for Carolina's game with N. C. State and South Carolina.

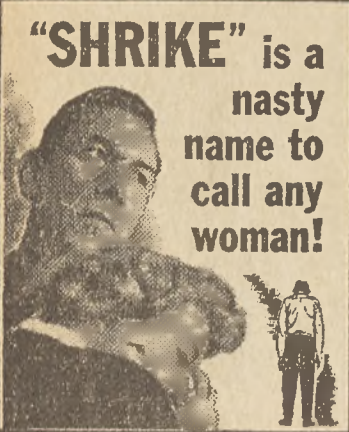
The game with State is being played at Raleigh on October 1. Arrangements have been made for University students to buy tickets for this game at half-price. They

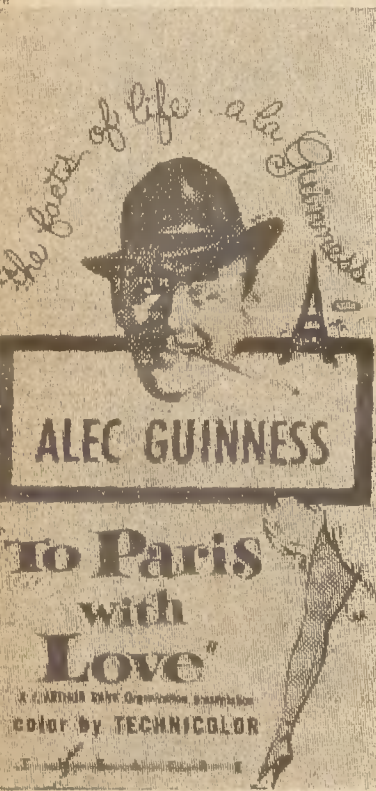

Mrs. Thedie Blackwood is confined to her home with a back injury.

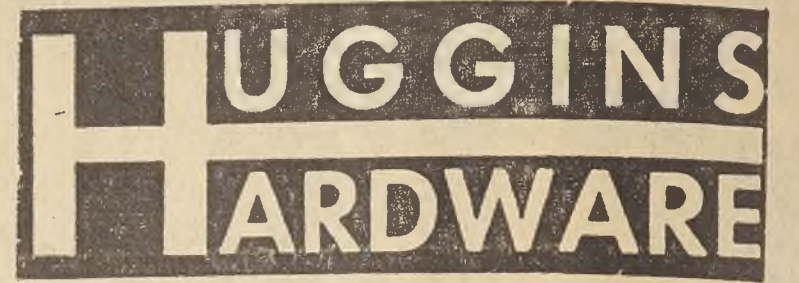
J. T. Crabtree, Jr. is seriously ill and is at Watts Hospital. Bobby Gooch has been confined to Duke Hospital for several days.

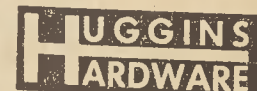
