Showing of 'Satellite' Is Extended One Week

Closing date for the current Morehead Planetarium presentation, "Satellites," has been extended an additional week until September 20. Manager Tony Jenzane has announced.

He explained that the change was made to enable the many students returning to colleges and universities in this area to see the performance, which is given at 7 p.m. nightly. The planetarium is also showing, in connection with "Satellites," a display of a replica of a MOUSE—a Minimum Orbital Unnamed Satellite of the Earth.

All Under 20 Now Eligible For Salk Shots

The second mass inoculation clinics for the Salk anti-polio vaccine is scheduled for Orange County school children next Wednesday, September 21.

The administration of the second shots for children of the Chapel Hill district schools is set for tomorrow. As last spring the shots will be given by cooperating doctors and the Health Department nurses at the Health Department offices and children of last year's first and second grades (this year's second and third) who took the first shot will be brought by school busses to the health offices.

Dr. O. D. Garvin announced that following these second clinics any vaccine left over will be made available to the general public of all ages through 19. It may be obtained at the offices in Hillsboro house on any Tuesday afternoon or at Chapel Hill on any Thursday afternoon as long as it lasts prior to October 1. Dispensation will be on a first come first serve basis. Some 1100 children received the

first Salk inoculations last spring prior to the furor created by the release of defective serum and only about 10 percent, according to Dr. Garvin, have availed themselves of the second shot in the previous clinics.

There will be no new parents' permission statements for next week's clinics. Parent is opposed to making the second shot make his objection known to give the inoculating child whose parents
