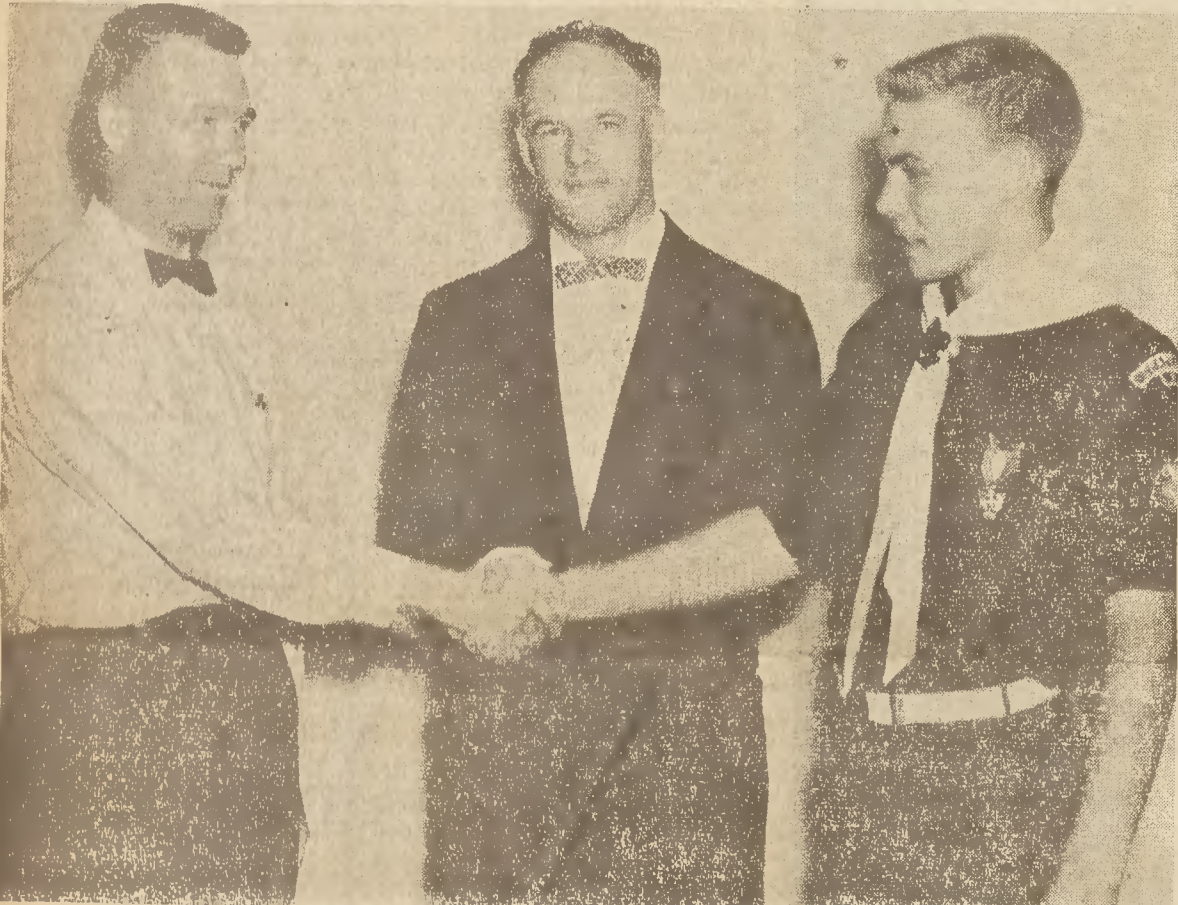

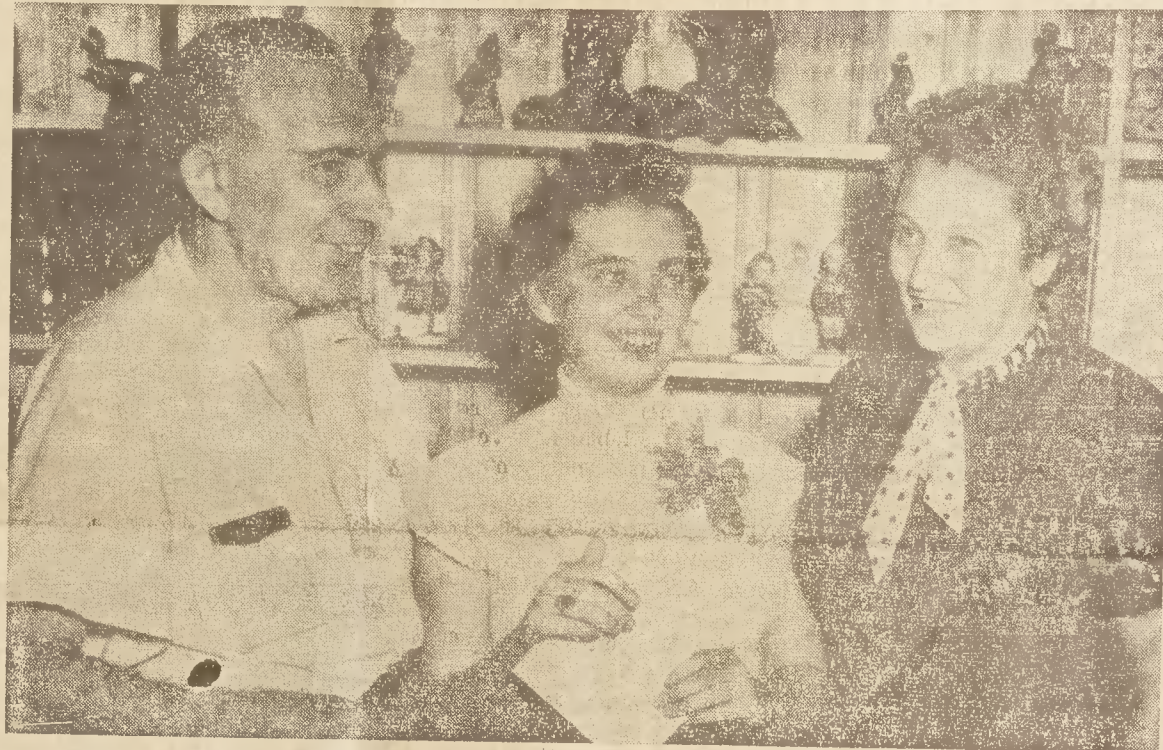

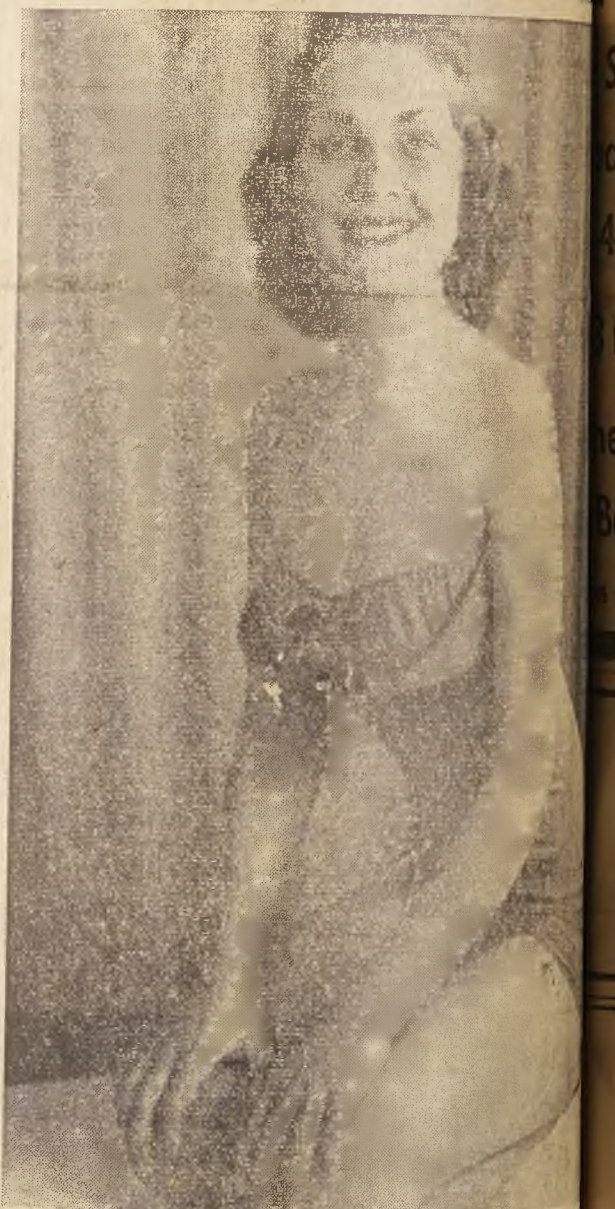

Garbage Houses Are Up

According to a survey completed yesterday, all the fraternity and sorority houses had completed the garbage houses that were to have been built by this year, with the exception of the Pi Beta Phi Sorority. Their project is in the process of being completed.

Dr. O. David Garvin of the District Health Dept. issued a sanitation regulation last fall stating that all fraternity and sorority houses that served meals to their members were to build fly-tigh houses

in which to keep their garbage cans. These houses were to have solid floors and drainage systems. When a survey was made last spring, approximately half the houses had completed the project.

Of the 36 fraternities and sororities in Chapel Hill, 32 serve meals. The four that don't serve meals are Alpha Kappa Psi, Delta Sigma Delta, Phi Delta Chi and

Psi Omega. The Alpha Delta Pi Sorority hasn't built a garbage house yet, since it is preparing to move to a new location.

Light Bulb Sale Planned By Jaycees This Week

A house-to-house sale of C-E-Z eye-ease light bulbs will be conducted by the Jaycees throughout the community on Wednesday and Thursday evenings.

The fund-raising project will be carried out under the leadership of George Coxhead, with almost the entire membership of the Club participating. Householders were asked by Mr. Coxhead to expect Jaycees to call on them any time after 7 o'clock both evenings. The C-E-Z bulbs, he said, are a new type of electric lamps that give a better type of light that is more restful to the eyes. Mr. Coxhead said. He added that they were not available through commercial channels.
