

Methodist Church In Glen Lennox Plans Opening Services This Sunday

Formal opening services for the new Methodist church organized recently in the Glen Lennox development will be held this Sunday morning.

On Monday evening at 8 o'clock the 70 charter members of the church will meet in the Glenwood Elementary School for the election of officers, and appointment of committees and commissions. The Sunday morning services will be held at 11 o'clock, also in the Glenwood School. At that time the Rev. W. L. Clegg of Durham, Superintendent of the Durham District of the Church, will present the charter membership certificates and deliver the sermon on the topic, "The Churches of God." All interested students and townspeople were invited to attend the services by the Rev. Kinsey King, pastor of the church.

Holy Family Mission Plans Are Announced

Plans are nearing completion for the five-day Teaching Mission to be held at the Church of the Holy Family, starting Sunday evening, October 2, and continuing through Thursday evening, October 6.

The Rev. Joseph O'Brien, Chaplain to the Episcopal students at Duke University, will conduct the mission and will give a series of five lectures centered around the theme, "The Good News Today." A native of East Liverpool, Ohio, Mr. O'Brien received his A.B. degree from Georgetown College in Kentucky in 1938 and his B.D. from the Colgate-Rochester Divinity School in Rochester, New York in 1942.
