

Paul Crabtree Now Building Body Shop

Paul Crabtree has begun construction of a new body shop on his property on the curve of East Main Street in Carrboro near the Hollywood Theater.

The new brick and block building will contain about 2,500 square feet and will be approximately 45 feet across the front and 53 feet deep. Three overhead doors will open from the building directly onto the curb. Mr. Crabtree said he hoped to be in the new building within a month.

The new plant will be equipped with Bear machinery for front end aligning and wheel balancing, acetylene and electric welding, and all auto body repairs and painting.

Mr. Crabtree has been in auto body work for 32 years, and has operated the Crabtree Body Shop independently for the last 10 years. For the last three and one-half years he has been located behind Wilson's Service Station on West Main Street in Carrboro.

Court's decision." He also suggested there was great question as to the constitutionality of the School Law.

'On Thin Ice'

In addition he aired the opinion that Governor Hodges' recent plea for voluntary school segregation on the part of the public was "on thin ice legally, but on thick ice politically."

Mr. Smith was introduced to the gathering by Dr. George Penick, Chairman of the Fellowship who announced that the group would henceforth meet on the fourth Thursday of each month.

In reports on the Fellowship's plans given before Mr. Smith's presentation, it was announced that plans were being made for an interracial Christmas program of some type and that speakers from areas in which desegregation had recently been effected would be presented on future Fellowship programs. 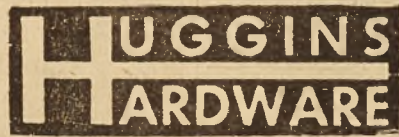

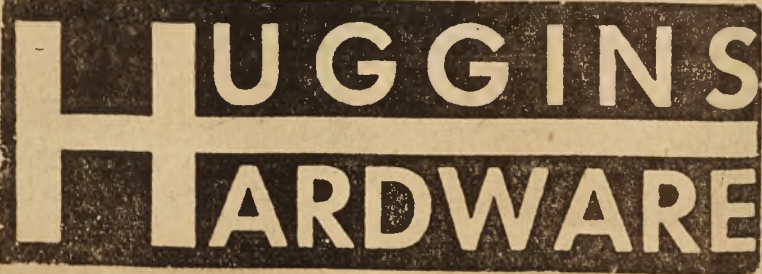

The Lincoln High Tigers took their third victory of the season on Friday afternoon, against Person High School in Roxboro, 19-0.

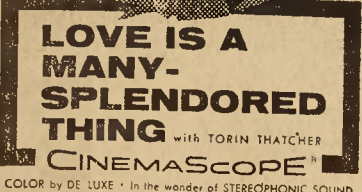
