The new brick and block building will contain about 2,500 squure feet and will be approximately 45 feet across the front and 53 feet deep. Three overhead doors will open from the building directly onto the curb. Mr. Crabtree said he hoped to be in the new building within a month.

The new plant will be equipped with Bear machinery for front end aligning and wheel balancing, acetylene and electric welding, and all auto body repairs and painting.



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
