

Carolina Over Tenn.; Duke To Have Hard Trip

Duke goes down to Atlanta to meet the rambling wreck from Georgia Tech. Each team has lost one game. Tech lost to Auburn 14-12 and Duke was defeated by Pitt 26-7. Duke's big problem is their star back, Sonny Jurgensen, who was injured in the Pittsburgh game. Duke will be up after the trouncing Pitt gave them; but without Jurgensen, the Devils will find it rough going in Atlanta. Winner-Georgia Tech.

Wake Forest moves into South Carolina to meet a good Clemson Squad. Clemson has defeated Presbyterian, Virginia, Georgia and South Carolina, and lost to Rice Institute 21-7. Wake Forest looked impressive in their win over Carolina. However, the Deacons will suffer a let down after last week and will fall before the Clemson Tiger. Winner-Clemson.

State College gained their first victory last week as they poured it on Villanova, 34-13. The Wolfpack plays Furman this weekend and will notch the second victory in a row. Winner-N.C. State.

The Maryland Terps are back in the number one spot in the national ratings after a decisive win over Syracuse. They will meet South Carolina this weekend in what will be just another step toward an undefeated season. Winner-Maryland.

Oklahoma moved up into second place in the national standings and they, too, have little to contend with, as the remainder of the opponents are conference teams. This week the Sooners will run over Kansas State with eyes already looking in the direction of Miami come New Year's Day. Winner-Oklahoma.
