How The Village Cooks

Today's recipe by Mrs. Mark Hanna combines the ingredients of complete simplicity and intriguing taste. This dish, because it is so inexpensive, is as suitable for a gala occasion as for a family dinner. It takes only a minute to prepare and your oven does the rest. You'll find this recipe in the revised and enlarged "Carolina Cooking" now on sale at many stores throughout the town. The Junior Service League has placed them so that you will have no difficulty in obtaining one.

HINTS: The ingredients may be put into the casserole in any order. For a taste change omit the mushrooms and use onion soup instead of the bullion. Allow at least an hour for cooking. It is done when all the liquid is absorbed by the rice. This is good served with beef or pork.

RICE CASSEROLE

- 1 stick butter or margarine 1 can beef boullion
- 1 cup raw rice
- 1 4-ounce can drained mushrooms (cut into small pieces if

Cut butter into four or five pieces. Place in two-quart casscrole. Add remaining ingredients. Cover. Place in 350 degree oven. Check in one hour to see if liquid has been absorbed. A few more minutes may be required. Serves
